AUSTRIA PLANS ATTACK ON NEUTRAL SHIPPING

Geneva, Feb. 28 .- According to an Innsbruck dispatch, Austria is going to follow Germany's lead couver and Victoria, will return in her piratical sea progress. ALLIED FLAGS FLOAT OVER DARDANELLES

London, March 1. - A dispatch from Athens says the Allies disembarked detachments of arti!lery near the destroyed Dardanelles forts and the British and French flags are now flying over them. The fleets continue the bombardment. A powder magazine was blown up, killing numerous victims. Mine sweeping operations continue. There are 50,000 Turkish troops on the European side and 15,000 on the Asiatic side.
