New York, March 1.—Very full skirts that stop five inches above the ankle—yes, the ankle, not the floor—and with petticoats underneath them, is the startling style news from Paris. Some of the elaborate frocks are even ten inches above.

Empire waist lines are the rule in the new suits and gowns, though Worth is showing a nipped in long bodice," writes a buyer for a New York House now in the French capital in a report of what she has seen at the Paris openings. "Sleeves are three-quarter and elbow length in the more elaborate afternoon suits. There are quite a few bolero jackets. Most of the other coats stop just about five inches below the hips, falling in godet folds from a waist line four inches higher than a natural one.

It is quite a change from a coat or jacket and makes such a pretty "throw over." Some girls here are already wearing it in fur.

Long capes for evening, with only slashes for the hands, are seen in charming models. The general style note is 1856. Hats are extremely simple. All the smart women in Paris are wearing the "Tipperary" suit; it is most popular. I have bought one and am sending it by the next steamer ship.




