SOLDIERS ACQUITTED OF HUNTER'S DEATH

Canadians Found by Welland County Jury to Have Been Justified in Shooting.

Welland, Ont., March 15.—The bill charging manslaughter against a Provincial police officer and three Canadian soldiers, who last fall fired upon two American duck hunters, Walter Smith and Charles Dorsch, killing Smith and wounding his companion, was dismissed by the Welland County grand jury. The men who were named in the bill are Police Officer Thomas C. Delaney, Corporal Archie Mayo and Privates Leslie Kinsman and E. McIntosh.

The shooting, which resulted in diplomatic correspondence between the United States and Great Britain and the paying by Canada of \$5,000 to Dorsch and \$10,000 to Smith's relatives, occurred on the Niagara River. Smith and Dorsch were said to have approached the Canadian shore, which was being guarded by soldiers against a possible invasion of Canada by Germans from the American side.

The soldiers, according to their own statement, fired when the two men failed to obey an order not to come any nearer.

BOWSER-McBRIDE SPLIT CONFIRMED--- THE INNER HISTORY OF THE TROUBLE

Dissolution of the House Was McBride' Bluff to Pull the Party Into Line---Bowser and His Following Refused to Submit and Called His Bluff

Vancouver, March 11.—The provincial political pot is now boiling to an extent never before attained in British Columbia. A battle for supremacy for the reins of government, not only between the two political parties, but between the leaders of the Conservatives, is evidently being launched. The McBride-Bowser partnership seems to be on the verge of dissolution and a fight for who is to be master is waxing hot between Sir Richard and Bowser. An announcement was made last Monday by the Premier that the election would be held on April 10, nomination, March 27. Like a bolt from the blue comes the announcement today from the same source that the election is indefinitely postponed. This change of plan suggests the strenuous war being waged in inner political circles. Owing to

open revolt on the floor of the House, in caucus and dissension in the Cabinet, and because of fear that lesser scandals unearthed may divulge some suggested larger similar operations the Premier is said to be heart-broken. When the majority of members, led by Bowser, went against him in caucus last week, McBride is said to have attempted to pull off a colossal bluff by publicly announcing the election date without consulting his colleagues and to have afterwards stated that unless the members decided to stand by him in the additional subsidy vote for railway policy he would carry his case to the country. It is rumored members have given McBride till today to back down from his position or else go it alone. The Bowser faction evidently is in the ascendency as an announcement was made today that an election would be postponed indefinitely, although rumor says May 10 is the likely new date. Besides the Cabinet upheaval the government's overwhelming majority has brought about dissension in the well ordered machine and everywhere there is a scramble of party workers for plums, with the result that three and four Conservative candidates are fighting for the nomination in many ridings. Several present members are being ousted by the machine, while others are retiring on account of old age, some from satisfied ambitions, cold feet, and other disabilities, including revulsion of feeling owing to the autocratic attitude of Bowser on all matters political. Rumor has it that the machine has to provide many of the faithful from Vancouver with plums, as there are not enough to get round on the coast. Many political aspirants are to be sent to outlying districts to win their spurs. Amongst other rumors, it is said that the Provincial Conservative machine has delegated to a Vancouver barrister the task of carrying the new Fort George riding for the McBride government. With the rapidly changing political events there is a belief gaining ground steadily here that possibly the postponement of

***** COPPER CABBAGES.

Milan, Italy, March 13.—Notwithstanding the precautions taken by the authorities to prevent the re-exportation from Italy to belligerent nations of goods classed as contraband of war, it has been discovered that large quantities of copper have been sent to Berlin concealed in trucks loaded with cabbages. Officials now have increased their vigilance in attempting to check this trade.

GERMAN ADVANCE IS STOPPED BY RUSSIAN FLANK MOVEMENT

NEW MOVEMENT OF GERMANS IN MLAWA DISTRICT IS FRUSTRATED--NORTH OF PRZASNSYZ ENEMY'S INFANTRY HAS LIKEWISE FAILED.

London, March 15.—Telegraphing from Petrograd, a Times correspondent says:

"The German advance in the Mlawa region of Poland has been delayed by the Russian action on their front and flanks. The German columns moving up the Orzseyo and Amulew Valleys have been checked.

"The enemy's infantry has failed to make headway on the plains north of Przasnysz. Milder weather has enabled them to

entrench but during Friday night they were seized with panic and withdrew three miles to the north, abandoning arms and ammunition.

"Our action on the extreme left of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's armies appears to have modified his plans."
