





Brauer, aide to Captain Thierichens. In raiding operations since the war broke out they have sunk seven British and French and, on January 29, one American ship, the Wm. P. Frye, the schooner shown in the picture. All that distinguished their conduct from old-time piracy is that the crew, in distinction to many of their compatriots, saved the lives of the vessels they destroyed. The picture of the Prinz Eitel was taken in Hampton Roads off Newport News on her arrival, and shows how formidable a craft she was at sea.
