**BELGIUM WILL BE IN VITAL CONTACT WITH THE EMPIRE**

"I cannot say all that I would like to say, but this much I can tell you: The future will see Canada and Belgium brought very close together," declared Dr. Charles Sarolea, K. O. L., author of "How Belgium Saved Europe" and other works on the war, when seen by the Star in the rooms of Mr. Vincent Massey, Dean of Victoria residence, where the distinguished visitor is staying. "It is my personal opinion," he continued, "that there will be a very great deal of emigration from Belgium to this country."

"In fact, Belgium will be really brought into vital contact with the British Empire. Thus far the two nations have had very little intellectual intercourse. Any intercourse there has been has been mainly commercial. It has not even been political in nature; certainly it has not been intellectual.

"But Belgium after the war will become the political and intellectual centre of Europe. She has always been more cosmopolitan than any country on the continent. Brussels is geographically the capital of it, and in the future will be an ideal centre for international schools. Hitherto all universities have been national; now the time is at hand when they shall be international—institutions to educate and train the mind on international lines. An international mind is the only condition of international peace."

Dr. Sarolea, a tall, ascetic-looking man, with the high forehead and deep grey eyes of a thinker, seemed to lose himself for a moment in the contemplation of that aspect of the future which appears to have the greatest appeal for him.

"How is it possible," he asked, "to solve international problems if each nation sees only its own side? How can one train a mind to view international problems when our institutions of learning are conducted along lines of exclusive and narrow-minded nationality?"

"This war has brought all the nations of the world together. To my mind, the most wonderful demonstration of this war is the fact of great community and solidarity of interests that it has made known. That community and solidarity of interests is world-wide.

"America is affected. The United States shrugs its shoulders and says: 'Oh, we have no interest in this war: it is for Europe.' But we are fighting the battles of America. If—God forbid it—Germany should emerge, I do not say triumphant, but not sufficiently crushed, Canada and the United States would have to enter the field of militarism—dreadnoughts and large armies. In order to save the countries of America from militarism, millions of our European soldiers are dying.

"My mission is to the United States, not to Canada. I intended to visit all the German cities in the United States for my government, and challenge pro-German propaganda. I do believe that the honest German-American is open to conversion, if only he has an opportunity to hear the other side."

Dr. Sarolea told of the nature of the proposed international university, which is to be known as the British-American University of Political Science and Journalism, two chairs in which have been promised from Canada, though from what sources he is not at liberty to divulge at present. Newspapers, he said, have hitherto remained too narrowly national. An international organization of the press for the purpose of educating public opinion, would do an enormous amount to help the movement.

The press has a supreme value for good or evil. Moreover, the university will have a department of Canadian colonization.

Speaking of the potency of such a university, "This," said Dr. Sa-

**THE LIBERAL PARTY AND THE WORKINGMAN**

Editor, The Daily News:

Sir—The economical bases of our social constitution are of various types. There are big landlords, industrial and agricultural interests, owned and operated on a large scale. The means of transportation and exchange are, especially on the American continent, owned and operated by powerful corporations subsidized by local and federal governments. There are stock-holders, money-lenders, of all denominations. These landed and monied aristocracies are by themselves a whole section of the social system, and constitute the bourgeoisie, the class that lives on dividends and profits levied on the multiform human activities.

Politically, they are the conservatives, for they really have something to conserve, preserve, for themselves and their heirs. How can the laborer of our community reconcile his interests with such a class? Of course, his simple mind sees the bosses who hand him the job alone, but nevertheless, the Tory party stands for the interests of the aforesaid classes. The treatment of the miners at Nanaimo, the alienation of hundreds of thousands of acres of the people's land to private speculators, the pledging of the credit of the province for generations to come to railway corporations, the Dominion Trust affair, etc., are there to testify the true essence of the party.

Next comes the little bourgeoisie, who can justly be called the managing directors of the social machine: professors, intellectuals, professional people, managers, contractors, employees of the State, corporations and municipalities, etc. These classes are politically and temperamentally the Liberal party, with an advanced school known as the Radical party. To cite an instance, in Great Britain, David Lloyd George is a great Radical and militates in the Liberal party as the leader of the Radical wing. He stands for reforms benefiting both his and the working class.

The old age pensions, the unrolea, "was a professors' war, prepared and hatched in universities. Race fanaticism percolated down from the German universities to the very lowest strata of the whole nation, and the idea of the 'super-race,' formerly the monopoly of the professors, became the creed of the public.

**Misguided Political Ideal.**

"Formerly people had the idea that principles didn't matter. We have found, through this war, that it was economic interests that didn't matter. This war arose not out of motives of economic interest; it was entirely the result of a misguided political ideal."

The question of how long it will take Belgium to recover from the effects of invasion and occupation depends entirely on the extent to which the country is assisted by her allies, said Dr. Sarolea. The whole country must be entirely rebuilt, and its population provided with capital. The delicate fabric of its trade and industry will require complete reconstruction. Belgium, the most artificial State of Europe, dependent entirely on international trade, with Germany as her most important customer, is commercially ruined, and it will require assistance of the most generous nature to restore previous conditions.

Dr. Sarolea arrived here yesterday from Ottawa, where M. Goor, the Belgian Consul General in Canada, gave a luncheon in his honor, at which Sir Robert Borden, Sir George Foster, Sir Joseph Cook and others were present. In the afternoon, he had a long talk with Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Dr. Sarolea lectured before the Canadian Club at Dunning's Hotel at 1 o'clock on the reconstruction of Belgium. He will return to Toronto in two weeks.—Toronto Star.

earned income tax, the compulsory insurance against injury, old age, sickness and unemployment, are the fruits of his remarkable activities. The next move will be the personal graduated income tax. Yet, we very often hear—and this from people that should know better—that there is no difference between Conservatives and Liberals.

The platform of the Liberal party of British Columbia has planks directly benefiting the working class; such as the eight-hour day, the reform of the workman's compensation act, and the land policy alone is the most important of all.

The redemption of the good land from the speculators' hands is essential for the welfare and credit of the province. The Tory politicians and the land speculators are interwoven with double thread, and before British Columbia emancipates itself of the heavy tolls it now pays on imported foodstuffs the land must be made productive. The only one who can do it is the bonafide settler.

The land question concerns the wage-workers more than any other class, and they must realize the fact that before reaching a superior stage of social evolution, the resources of the country must be more productive.

The Tory party has done, and will continue to do, the reverse. The policy of corner lots inaugurated and fostered by the British Columbia government has broken the economical backbone of every community. The gigantic wild cat real estate gambling, perpetrated under the auspices of the local government, has plundered the savings of the country, and more especially those of the working class. The Dominion Trust swindle is only a trifle in comparison.

Fifty per cent of the real estate titles and agreements of sale are mere "scraps of paper." Real estate values can only be based on population, and population in British Columbia can only come by throwing the lands open for settlement. The Liberals will do it.

Let the intelligent workers of Prince Rupert co-operate, collaborate, with a party that will represent the citizens at large, and not the corporations and monopolies; a party that will not cater to the speculators, that will do away with monopolies and protectionism; a party that must perform its mission, indispensable to the manual and intellectual workers to evolve towards a superior order of social justice and guide the destinies of the world.
