THE KITCHEN FLOOR

A Helpful Cleaning Hint

Plain boiled linseed oil is a good finish for the kitchen floor. It should be put on when the floor is new or clean of other finish and applied as needed afterward. Such a floor will have a pleasing, light brown color, will not show marks or scratches, and kept well oiled, but not sopt with grease. Heat the oil and apply at night, rubbing it in well. In the morning wipe with cold water, and the floor is ready for use. Wash it with warm water dashed with a little kerosene.
