WANTS VENUE ALTERED

New Alderman Makes Interesting Motion

TRIAL OF STRIKERS

Ald. Douglas Inquires if Council Could Have Venue Changed—Mayor Replies That It is Too Late Now.

Can the city council do anything to alter the venue of the trial of the strikers? was a question asked by Alderman Douglas last night at the city council meeting. He would have put the matter in the form of a motion that the council should do something, but was not very sure that this would be the best way.

Mayor Manson informed Alderman Douglas that the venue of the trial had now been fixed, and it was not possible for the city council to ask or even suggest a change of venue.

For the new alderman's benefit the Mayor had the letter received last week from the Deputy Attorney General produced by the City Clerk. This letter refers to the proposal to hold a Supreme Court in Prince Rupert, stating that the matter is held over until after the Attorney General returns.

CULVERT COLLAPSED

In the course of his walks around town recently Alderman Clayton discovered a culvert on Third avenue which had evidently collapsed while under construction. Must Wait for Assessment Settlement

BEFORE BEING REPAIRED

Council Approached Gen Supt. Mehan Who Says He Can do Nothing Until Mr. Chamberlin Arrives or Until the Assessment is Settled.

Efforts made by the streets committee to obtain some concessions in the way of a supply of lumber from the G. T. P. Co. through Gen. Supt. Mehan for the repair of Centre street, have failed. The Gen. Supt. explained that he is not in a position to do anything at all regarding Centre street until after the assessment question is settled one way or another, or until Mr. Chamberlin arrives.

There was some little irritation felt in council last night about this matter. Alderman Hilditch probably expressed this most strongly when he said that every single ounce of freight landed on the G. T. P. Wharf has to be transferred up Centre street, and if the G. T. P. did not choose to help keep the street in repair the freight might stay on the wharf as long as they liked to let it lie there.

This slightly ruffled feeling was modified by Alderman Morrissey who remarked that it was hardly fair to Mr. Mehan whose treatment of the council committee was most courteous, and whose suggestion was after all quite businesslike one—to wait until the assessment matter pending is settled when the whole situation may be different.

It was agreed to let the matter rest on the table for a week.
