

NEW EMPRESSES WILL BE SPEEDY

Contract Calls for 23 Knots on
Their Trial

It is stated that the two new Empresses which the C. P. R. are having built for the Pacific trade will be of 16,000 tons, making them the largest boats in the trans-Pacific trade. The contract calls for a speed of 23 knots on their trial, but they will be run at a sea speed of 18 knots. This is a knot an hour faster than the record made by the Empress of Japan eleven years ago, when she crossed in ten days, ten hours. If the new vessels were speeded they could cross in eight days.

Grand Trunk May Put Line
Into Boston

CONTINUOUS LINE FROM
HERE

**Big Newspaper Devotes Much
Space to Interview with Pres.
Hays and Vice-Pres. Fitzhugh
Great Significance to Prince
Rupert.**

Prince Rupert linked with Boston, by one continuous line of railway, sometime in the very near future, is in the horoscope, according to the information obtained by the Boston "American," a powerful daily newspaper in the largest city in New England. Representatives of the "American" interviewed President Charles M. Hays and Vice-President McHugh recently and the information obtained is to the effect that the Grand Trunk are seriously considering building a line into Boston to compete with the other roads entering there.

So eager are the Bostonians to get this project consummated that they have formed a club of prominent business men to use their influence in the matter.

Will Connect With Big Cities

The Grand Trunk already has a line running into Portland, Maine, and the Central Vermont railroad, operated by the G. T. R. runs from Montreal into New London, Conn. Portland is 115 miles from Boston on the Atlantic seaboard and New London is about 90 miles from the Hub City.

The significance of a direct line into Boston from here can easily be imagined by anybody with even half the ordinary imagination. So much importance does the "American" place on the proposal that in their issue of April 23 almost two whole pages are given to it. Copies of these pages are pasted up in Uncle Jerry's office window.

What Project Means

There is also some talk of extending the G. T. R. line into Providence, R. I. If this is brought about Prince Rupert will be in direct communication with all the chief ports along the Atlantic coast and midway between the Orient, that great commercial market of tomorrow, and the great manufacturing centres of Eastern Canada and the New England States.

MINERS ARE NOW BUSY

Budget of News from the Stewart Camp

ACTIVE PROGRESS

New Water Power Plant at Red Cliff is Nearly Completed—Party of British Shareholders Will Come in July.

Stewart, May 17.—Engineer Cowie is making excellent progress in the installation of the water power plant, and has received the last of the shiements, including a Tuttle water wheel for Red Cliff Mine.

In July a large number of English shareholders of the Red Cliff Mining Co. Ltd., headed by Mr. Chadwick, one of the heaviest shareholders, whose son is on the English Board of Directors, will arrive here to inspect the property. By that time a spur from the Canadian North Eastern Railway will have been laid to the property, and the mine will undoubtedly have joined the shipping ranks.

Portland Wonder

There is a rumor going the rounds that strong interests are quietly picking up the stock with a view to securing control. The property has been under development practically all winter and the mine is said to be looking better than at any period in its history.

Glacier Creek

The Directors of the Glacier Creek Mining Co., Ltd., have secured the services of W. J. Elmendorf, M. E., as consulting engineer, and development will be undertaken in the continuation of the present tunnel, immediately.

International

An additional contract for tunnel work has been let to Roy Clothier, who has during the past winter driven over 200 feet on this property.

Big Casino

Word has been received from Vancouver that William Irwin is successfully engaged in a reorganization of the company with a view to secure further capital so that the property may be developed on a proper scale.

Bitter Creek

Manager George Brown who has been ill in California for some weeks is reported to be on the road to recovery, and by the end of the month is expected here to resume charge at the mine.

Roy Clothier has been instructed to take charge of the development of this property by those who have the claims under bond.

To Resume Operations

Major R. G. Edward-Leckie is expected in camp at the end of the month to resume development on several properties in which he is interested. The partnership heretofore existing between the Major and H. B. Williams, mining engineer, has been dissolved, Mr. Williams having accepted a year's contract to go to Soudan. Major Leckie will be accompanied by another engineer who will have charge of his local mining interests.
