

WANT TO REVISE THE BYLAWS OF HOSPITAL

Special Meeting to be Called on June 6th—Arranging a Loan of \$4,000 for Current Needs

It will be necessary to hold a general meeting of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association for the purpose of considering the Revised By-laws now being prepared on the lines of the Victoria Jubilee Hospital By-laws. This decision was come to at the meeting of the Hospital Board yesterday afternoon in the new police court. There was a good deal of conversational discussion on the subject, and Mr. C. V. Bennett advised the Board on a number of points that were tentatively touched upon.

Remember June 6th

As a result of the discussion President D. G. Stewart suggested that the meeting should fix the evening of Tuesday, June 6th, for the general meeting of the association to go into the revision of the by-laws. The meeting will be called for 8 p.m. on that day, and will be held in the new police

court. As the last general meeting of the association had to be doubly advertised owing to the meagre turnout of members at first, the press-men present were requested to emphasise the importance of this special general meeting.

Require \$4000

In order to carry on the work of the Hospital at present the sum of \$4000 in ready cash is required, and the Board has authorised the borrowing of this sum through the Union Bank which has been approached on the matter. The bonds relating to the hospital property are lodged with the bank as collateral, and the following information as to the hospital finances is furnished the bank manager for forwarding to the head office before the branch here can negotiate the loan. Already the sum of \$6000 has been borrowed. To make up \$10,000 required by the hospital another \$4000 is needed, and the hospital can count on coming assets thus: Outstanding subscriptions \$3,454.30, Outstanding fees \$1,505.10, B. C. Government Grant due quarterly, first quarter now due \$1,058.10. Besides which the city has promised \$5,000. With this information furnished for his Headquarters to consider, Mr. Broderick of the Union Bank here, is confident that the loan will be forthcoming.

Honorary President

Some talk was engaged in yesterday on the subject of the suggested appointment of an honorary president with voting powers in Board matters. This is a question still to be decided, though President D. G. Stewart is inclined to the opinion that the Board favors this appointment. Among other minor matters was also discussed the appointment of a nurse probationer which is not approved by the Matron or the medical fraternity at the present stage of the hospital's history. There are thirteen patients at present in the wards, and the institution is thriving says the Assistant Secretary.

Stewart's Offer

Not the genial President, but the town of Stewart, made an offer to the Hospital Board yesterday. The offer was from the Secretary of the Amateur Dramatic Society of Stewart that the society should come down to Rupert and give an entertainment all the proceeds of which should go to the Hospital Funds, provided only that the Board would pay the expenses of the amateur company's visit. The idea was not considered a practical one, though the Board appreciated the offer of the Stewart amateurs, and M. M. Stephens thought it strange that Prince Rupert has to learn from Stewart that an amateur dramatic society can do a lot to liven up a city.

A BOOST FOR PEACE VALLEY

Prof. Chamberlain Tells Senate Committee It Can Supply the World With Wheat.

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Washington, May 27.—In giving evidence here before the finance committee of the Senate, which is collecting evidence for and against reciprocity, Prof. Chamberlain of the South Dakota State University said that the Peace River Valley in British Columbia could supply the world with wheat.

He asked the committee to go very slow in throwing open the American market to Canadian wheat.

"They'll swamp us," he said.

In Honor of A Great Queen

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an open procession through the streets of London.

The dedication ceremonies all took place near Buckingham Palace, where the great monument to the late Queen will overtop the Mall and rear its stately proportions high in the air, crowned by a gigantic statue of Victory done in bronze.

A troop of the famous Life Guards preceded the open carriage of the King and Queen; followed by many more barouches, bearing the Prime Minister, members of the Cabinet, dukes, duchesses, members of Parliament, and a host of other notables.

At the foot of the monument

a great platform had been erected and it was here that the actual ceremonies attendant upon the dedication took place.

The monument itself is one of the most striking structures ever undertaken by man, and has consumed a period of building commensurate with its magnitude. Nine years ago the scheme for this memorial was set afoot by King Edward and Sir Aston Webb.

A model was prepared, which included an addition to the new Hall, a garden, new walls and gates, etc., and Brock, the famous sculptor, was engaged to build the whole. He set to work with a will, gathered about him some of the most accomplished artists in Europe, and in a short time the scheme began to take form.

Time passed, and in 1909, when the citizens of London had nearly forgotten that such a structure was in the course of construction, the mantle of planks was torn from the partly completed edifice on the late Queen's birthday anniversary, and London was given the chance to view the partly completed structure. Then came the untimely death of King Edward, the succession of King George and the plans for the Festival of Empire, with its proposed dedication of the memorial.

FATALLY SHOT BY A BURGLAR
