The Queen Alexandra is a regular ferry steamer, having seats arranged similar to those in the street cars. She makes 22 knots an hour, which is almost nine knots faster than the Charmer. As a result the time for the trip between Vancouver and Nanaimo will be about two hours instead of three.
