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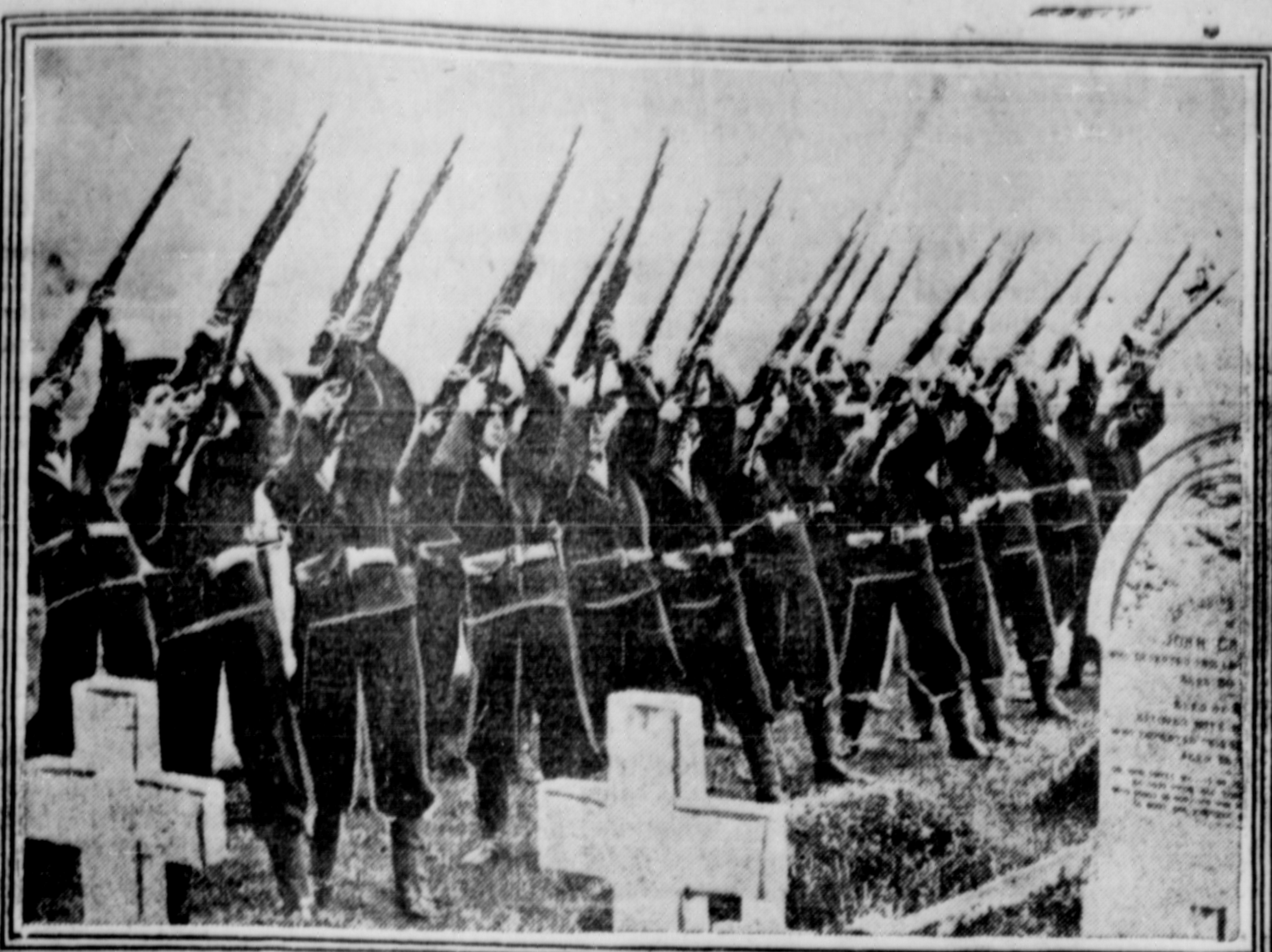

ST. JOHN AMBULANCE ASSO. IS DOING SPLENDID WORK

ASSOCIATION IS PROVING TO BE ONE OF GREAT SERVICE TO THE EMPIRE IN THE PRESENT WAR—PROVIDES QUALIFIED MEN FOR AID AT FRONT.

Splendid attendance and active interest is being manifested by those who have joined the local center of the St. John Ambulance Association and a men's class of 30 is diligently taking up the studies for first aid under the tuition of Dr. J. P. Cade and Dr. H. E. Tremayne. Classes are held every Tuesday evening at the city hall at 7:30 p. m. and immediately previous to the lectures Mr. King, a certificated member, and Sergeant North, of the Fusiliers, give the members practical demonstrations of bandaging and how to carry the injured. A ladies' class will be formed just as soon as the necessary text books and supplies are received from headquarters, but owing to the unprecedented demand for supplies throughout Canada it may be some time before local requirements are filled.

That the work of the ambulance brigade of the association is proving of vast service to the Empire in supplying qualified men for the army on the continent, for the navy and for home requirements in England in this time of stress, the following open letter from Col. Sir J. R. Andrew Clark, is handed The News by Percy F. Godenrath, honorary secretary of the local association:

"Sir,—As the many supporters and well-wishers of the St. John Ambulance Brigade and also, perhaps, the public generally may be interested to learn what support that body has given to the nation in the present crisis, may I ask you if you could find room in your paper to publish the following short report?

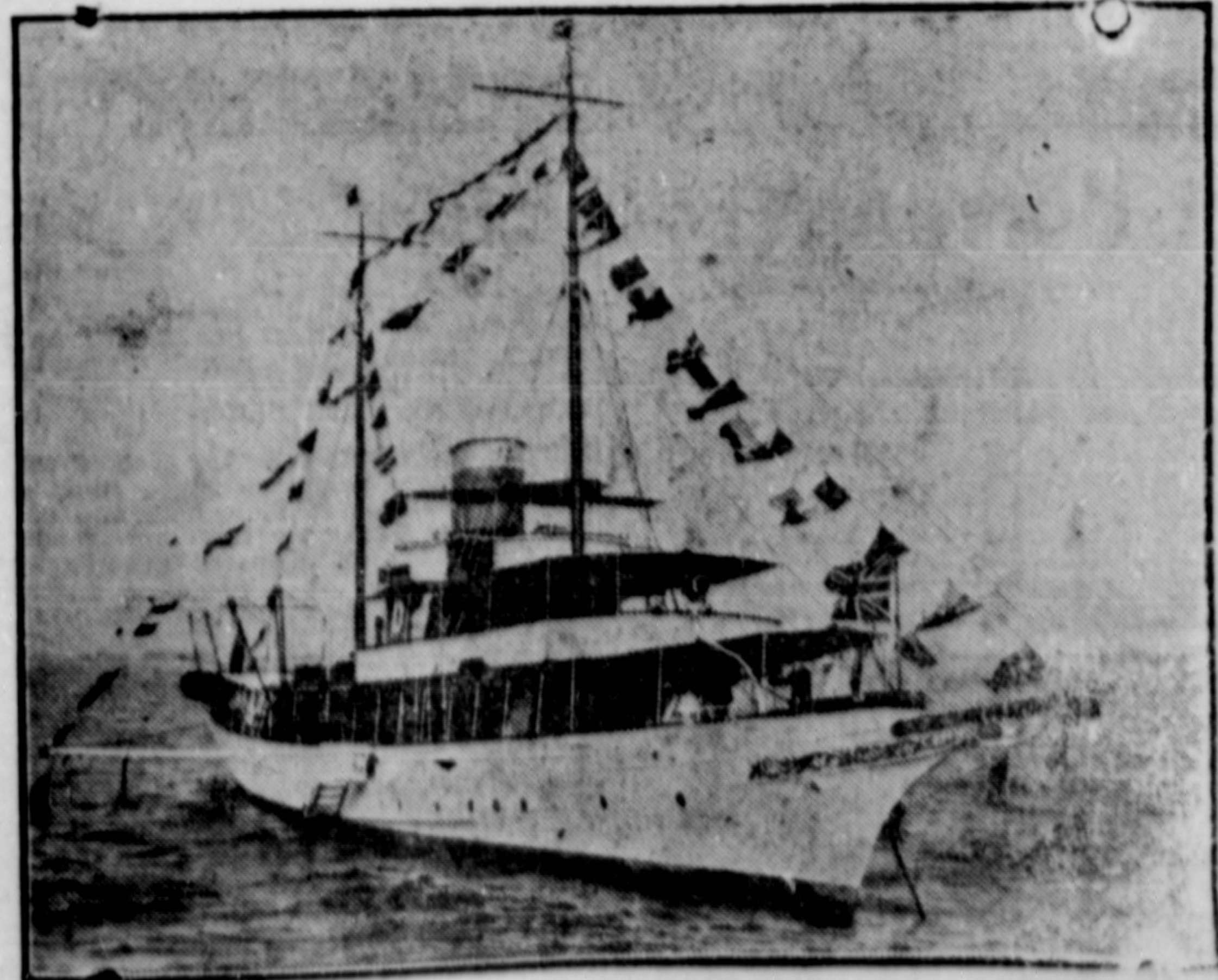
"The brigade received its first official notification that its services might be required on July 31st. On the Saturday, August 1, a telegraphic request was received from the Admiralty Medical Department to provide them with 850 men to proceed at once to Plymouth, Portsmouth, and Chatham. This was further increased to 1,000 by the morning of August 3. By the evening of that day 900 men had reported themselves at one or other of the depots above mentioned. Since then the number has been increased to 1,200.

"On Monday, August 3, the Medical Department of the army called for the immediate mobilization of the Military Home Hospitals Reserve of the Brigade, 2,500 strong, and for 450 extra men to proceed abroad for the expeditionary force. By the evening of Saturday, the 8th inst., the whole of these men had joined at their respective destinations, making a total, including those supplied to the medical department of the navy, of 4,150.

"To fill up gaps and to respond to further calls that may be made by either the Admiralty or the War Office, there is a roll of 2,000 names of men waiting anxious and ready to sign on at a moment's notice for service at home or abroad, and the numbers on the roll are daily increasing.
