The whole Empire has been stirred up by the doings of the British troops in France. It is intensely gratifying to know that the old British tenacity is still as strong as ever, and that the Highlanders of today can emulate the daring of their grandfathers at Waterloo by charging solid columns holding by the stirrup-leathers of the Scottish cavalry.

The heart of every Briton must thrill as he reads of these things, but what the man in the street is waiting for is a real ding-dong sea fight. He is wearying to hear that the British bluejackets have knocked the German fleet to smithereens. Meantime, the naval warfare has been pretty much a game of chess, with Sir John Jellicoe proving himself a past-master in the game. In no war of the past have the high seas been so clear for the merchantmen of a belligerent country.

When the time for striking does come, Jack will be right there as of old. In the days of

the "wooden walls," when he clambered aboard the enemy with his cutlass in his teeth, he was a terror; today, though with vastly different weapons and at a much greater distance, he goes into the fight with Nelson's famous dictum ringing in his ears and the same old bulldog courage in his heart.

For the German naval man Jack has a supreme contempt. The German conscript is merely a soldier helping to garrison a floating fortress and will never be a sailor.

Jack Tar is born with the tang of the sea in his blood, while the German is brought from the factory and the plow; forced to serve his three years; and then goes back to his civilian vocation again.

Gunnery plays a much more important part in naval warfare today than in the past, and in this the British navy is second to none, but, as of old, seamanship and courage are the supreme factors in a sea fight and British seamanship and courage must win.

GRAY HAIR MEN AND BOYS FORCED TO FIGHT

Defeats of Austrians Induce Extreme Cruelty in Their Handling of Prisoners.

Petrograd, Oct. 2.—Specialists here estimate that the extreme limits of Austro-German resources in men for this war do not exceed 6,000,000, about two-thirds being German and the other third Austrian.

The Germans have lost in France, Belgium and East Prussia, together with their vast losses in concert with Austria in Galicia, no fewer than 1,000,000 men. The Austrians in their conflict with Russia and Serbia have likewise lost another 1,000,000 men in killed, wounded and prisoners, the latter being particularly numerous, owing to the readiness of the Slav elements—about one-half of the total Austrian armies—to surrender to their fellow-Slavs.

This leaves the Teutonic belligerents with four millions, to some extent made up of last-line resources—children, and men over 60 years of age. Of these, one million are in array against the French and British, and another quarter to half a million on lines of communication through Belgium and occupying fortresses. The total, therefore, available now for taking up positions against Russia does not exceed from two and one-half to two and three-quarter millions.

People Feel the Pinch.
German armies in the field doubtless get fed, but the populace is already feeling the squeeze, as is proved by orders restricting the killing of cattle. The orders issued forbid killing young calves or cows under seven years of age. It is in this vital work of starving Germany that the British fleet is accomplishing more far-reaching results than even the victorious armies.

The Austrians are apparently showing as little mercy to the wounded as the Germans are said to be doing. An officer, who has returned from a Galician battlefield, says he saw numberless instances of brutality. German and Austrian officers, with their orderlies, went around this field strewn with dead and dying. Their salutation to any dubious case was a kick in the ribs, with the order, "Aufstehen," if any signs of life were shown, the helpless sufferer being finished off by an officers' revolver or with men's gun-butt.

The fate of the Cossack who is taken alive is one to be dreaded. It is asserted that the Cossacks have inspired such fear in the enemy that when one is captured torture is resorted to before death is inflicted.

PRESIDENT FALCONER TALKS TO HOME GUARD

Eight Hundred Sharpshooters Parade Streets and Hear Speeches.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—The Home Guard Sharpshooters, nearly 800 strong, and accompanied by their own band of thirty pieces and the Boy Scout pipe band, paraded last night in battalion formation. After drilling, the guard marched up Bay Street and proceeded via Queen, Yonge and Shuter Streets to the Arena, which was opened to them on account of the rain. Here they were addressed by President Falconer, who spoke a few words of encouragement to them, emphasizing the necessity of the sacrifices everyone was called upon to make. General Otter, the colonel-in-chief, was on parade, as was also Professor Wrong and Mr. W. S. Dinnick. Five of the companies are now up to full strength.

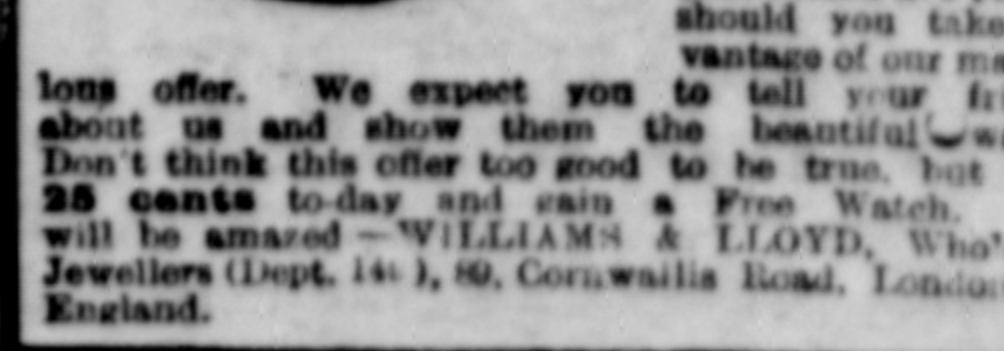
