LA BELLE FRANCE

One of the most notable things which the allied soldier takes heed of on arrival in France is the manner in which the population of the country districts cling to the poor remnants of their homes, such as have been left surviving from the tide of German invasion.

As close behind the fighting line as it is possible to get, the sturdy peasant is once more tilling the fruitful soil and restoring that orderliness which is characteristic of the country districts of France. Their faith in the ultimate success of the allied arms is unshakable.

The work of reconstruction is greater in a material sense in France than in the other. What the Huns could not take away with them, they destroyed, rendering the whole countryside as inhospitable as possible for first, the allied armies, and secondly for the French people, whose resilient spirit they would break, if they could. Houses, factories, fruit and shade trees were wantonly destroyed. They could not be taken for the enrichment of Germany.

The great strategic retiral took place early last spring, and in the month of May the work of reconstruction was in full swing over the territory thus evacuated. In the fall of 1916, the Germans had planted crops of grain behind their lines for their own sustenance, and their retiral took place too hurriedly for these to be destroyed, as doubtless they would have liked to do. These crops were reaped by the French peasantry. Already five new villages have been reconstructed and are being used in the grain growing districts of the previously ruined areas.

Great assistance has been given by the Red Cross Societies from overseas to French people, not so much in money as in kind. Over forty thousand articles have been sent from this continent by the American Red Cross as required. These comprise everything from window glass to setting eggs. Among the gifts which are being arranged for

now are thousands of fruit trees to take the places of those destroyed. New fruit stock has already been budded upon the stumps of the trees cut down by the vandals, and even last summer fresh growth was to be seen upon the trees which the foe had hoped to make useless forever.

It will take years and years of steady work to restore the ruined portions of France to their pristine state. The work is of immense proportions, and will hardly be completed by this generation. The outward evidence of the gradual progress of the last hundreds of years in this part of France has been obliterated by the modern high explosives, and the French people, with the assistance of their friends, are having a tremendous opportunity for landscape and town-planning on such a scale as otherwise would never have been offered.

The new France will arise the more glorious, reborn like the phoenix, and purged with fire.

Vancouver, February 11.—The schooner Knickerbocker is in port from the north with no fish, but she brought a sheaf of bills which the New England Fish Company will have to pay. The schooner left here three months ago on a fishing venture but had engine trouble soon after reaching the banks and she sailed into Yakutat. The schooner Prospector was sent north to tow the Knickerbocker to Ketchikan where temporary repairs were carried out and the schooner came here under her own power. Extensive repairs will be carried out here. Result of the trip: Fish, none; expenses, \$8,000.
