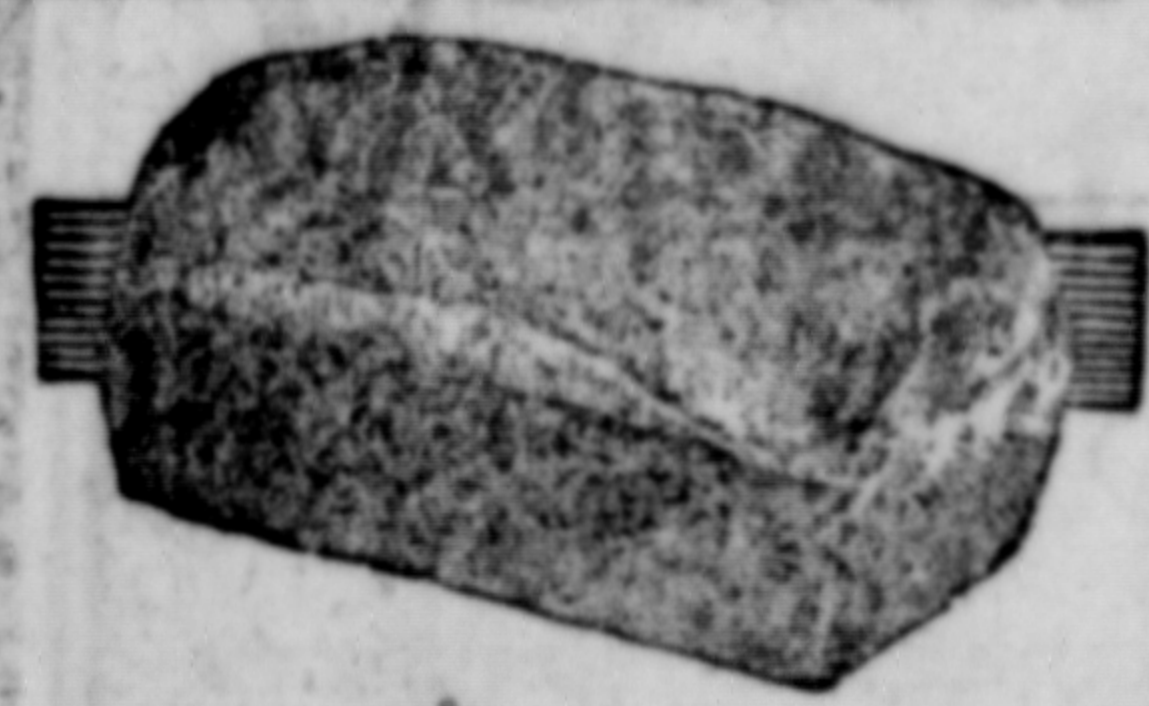

TEN YEARS FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Four Foreigners Found Guilty of Killing Alex. Boychuk Near Vegreville.

EDMONTON, Oct. 15.—The supreme criminal court jury after a deliberation of fifty minutes on the evidence submitted during the past four days in the cases of Wasyk Kusk, Wasyk Lihun, Mitro Lihun and John Serepnok, who were charged with the murder of Alex. Boychuk at Soda Lake, near Vegreville, on August 24, 1921, brought in a verdict that the men were guilty of manslaughter, thus reducing the charge of murder. Chief Justice Harvey afterwards sentenced each of the four men to serve a term of ten years imprisonment in the Prince Albert penitentiary.

The prisoners when they were made aware of the decision of the jury through the interpreter, received the news of their fate without any visible signs of emotion and when the sentence was imposed they maintained the same attitude. They were informed that the term might be lessened if they showed good conduct, and they might get out on parole according to the regulations governing such cases.

Lawyer Makes Appeal.

When asked prior to the imposing of sentence if they had anything to say, they replied that they had nothing to say to themselves, but that they would trust their lawyer to make an appeal in their behalf. Then C. G. McGill, K.C., made an urgent appeal for clemency, stating that he lent view that the jury had taken of the case in bringing in a verdict of manslaughter, and not murder was an indication they recognized that the men had acted under great fear and provocation on the night Boychuk lost his life.

Must Abide by Laws.

In passing sentence Chief Justice Harvey said that he could not see his way clear to be lenient, because he felt that the men came from a community where assaults and attacks were very common, and they must be

taught to respect Canadian law and order, and British institutions. He said that he felt constrained to pass fairly severe sentence and gave the men the sentence as stated above.

The prisoners then were lead away by the provincial police, and John Schlam interpreted the finding of the jury and the sentence imposed to the court, which was crowded with foreigners from the district from which the prisoners came.

Beaten to Death.

Boychuk, who was wanted by the police for robbery, was a bully who it is alleged tried to make the accused give false evidence to clear him. They quarrelled and all four set on him and beat him until he declared he had had enough and by that time he was past recovery. The four then gave themselves up to the police.
