#### Fire Limits For The City.

this easy enough for the city to pass bylaws, but it is another thing to enforce the provisions. We have heard of cities passing bylaws regulating the height of buildings and restricting to six storeys. Then a few weeks after a big concern comes along and offers to erect a fine block if they can be allowed to make it eight storeys. The council rushes over itself to pass the necessary bylaw rescinding the former one, because a big business block was the one thing the city needed.

In Prince Rupert we tax vacant property very high, the idea being to encourage building. Yet there are now more buildings here than we can at present use. We are quite consistent. have building regulations which have been broken again and again. If very stringent regulations are imposed, the tendency will be for business to take some other course. Streets outside the fire limits will be built upon instead of those within.

#### Fairly Good Buildings

Should Be Required. At the same time there is a medium course. Fairly good buildings should be required which will not be a menace to the rest of the community and which will be a credit to the city. There seems little doubt that permanent buildings are the cheapest but in the absence of mortgage money to loan it is sometimes difficult to finance very expensive buildings. All these things have to be taken into consideration. It is not wise to be too stripgent at the beginning else we are likely to defeat the very condition we are trying to bring about. Moderation in building bylaws as in everything else seems to be what is required.

#### Mill Sale Takes Place This Week.

The sale of the property of the Prince Rupert Pulp & Paper Co. Ltd. including the Prince Rupert lumber and planing mill is set for this week and a company has been formed, apparently for the purpose of buying it if the price is not too high. The property includes a lot of very valuable timber limits and when the sale is completed there seems every likelihood that the purchasers will proceed to use the mill and possibly to erect a pulp mill. It will then be for us to try to secure the erection of the big works in Prince Rupert. Should it go to the Naas River, where a lot of the limits are located, or to the Ecstall River where the power might be generated, Prince Rupert would not benefit as it would from the mill being placed either on the townsite or very close


