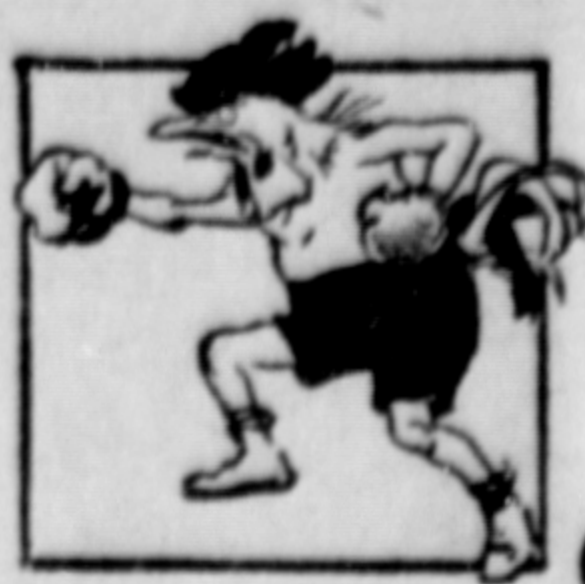

BRITISH COLUMBIA FRUIT PACKERS TO SHOW ENGLISHMEN

OTTAWA, June 18.—In order to introduce the methods so successfully used in British Columbia for the packing of fruits for long distance shipments, the Fruit Branch of the Department of Agriculture has arranged to bring an expert packer from British Columbia to Ontario.

The markets of the Prairie Provinces have been accustomed to and will pay a premium for the packages used in the western fruit growing sections. In order that Ontario shippers may be in a position to take the greatest possible advantage of these favorable markets the expert will give demonstrations in the packing of fruit in western packages throughout the fruit growing sections of the province.

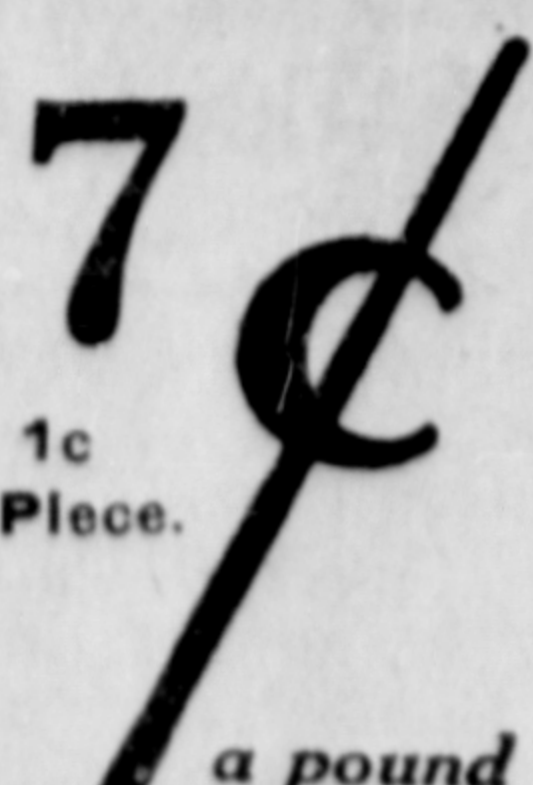
