Facing charges of driving an automobile while under the influence of liquor and also with breaking and entering the house of Charles Youngman, Graham Avenue, George Walley, taxi driver, landed in the cells of the city police station this morning, having been arrested by Chief Vickers.

Complaint was entered at the police station at 10 o'clock this morning by Charles Youngman. According to Mr. Youngman's story, Walley drove up Graham Avenue in company with Walter Seringeur and stopped in front of the Youngman home. He went to the house and attempted to get in a window but was pluckily stopped by Mrs. Youngman. He then went around to the back door and made his entry there and proceeded to pursue Mrs. Youngman who went to the telephone and called for her husband. Walley dashed Mrs. Youngman away from the phone and then made his retreat. In the meantime, Mr. Youngman had taken a car from town and, on his arrival at the entrance of his home, he saw the car containing Walley driving towards Atlin Avenue. Mr. Youngman saw the car pass him but decided to notify the police.

On being notified, Chief Vickers proceeded down Second Avenue and arrested Walley as he was about to leave the car between Seventh and Eighth Streets. Seringeur in the meantime had left the automobile.

FOR MOTHERS OF  
YOUNG DAUGHTERSPrincipal of Technical High  
School Has Peculiar  
Ideas

CHICAGO, June 16.—(By Canadian Press) — Ten commandments for women who are mothers of daughters were recently given to members of the Chicago Woman's Club by Miss Dora Wells, principal of the Lucy Flower Technical High School, who said:

"I think my first duty to her is to give her a father fit to have a daughter.

"Gurgling aunts and roaring uncles should not exploit her for affection's sake.

"Multiplicity of playthings tends to scatter a child's attraction.

"As my daughter grows older I should give her as many objective interests as possible. I should want her to be an out-of-doors girl, able to skate, swim and take part in all games suited to her age and strength.

"I should consider moving pictures a rare treat. A teacher can detect the habitual attendant upon the movies almost as quickly as she can a smoker of cigarettes.

"She should have plenty of good books, with lots of fairy tales. I should not want my daughter's faith in story and myth to be such that the truth would come to her as a shock.

"Sex instruction in the home, not the school.

"I should not delegate this duty to a teacher, nor a friend, nor a book. I should tell her myself, knowing full well that if I do not somebody else will.

"When my daughter reaches the age when she begins to do up her hair and to long for earrings and a powder puff, I should see to it that she has several boy friends. I should expect her to fall in love more than once during this period. But if, unfortunately, she thinks she is in love with one real person to the exclusion of others, I should want her to see a great deal of him.

"Propinquity begets repulsion as well as attraction.

"I should try to remember at all times that my daughter belongs to herself and not to me. Value of money and home making should be emphasized.

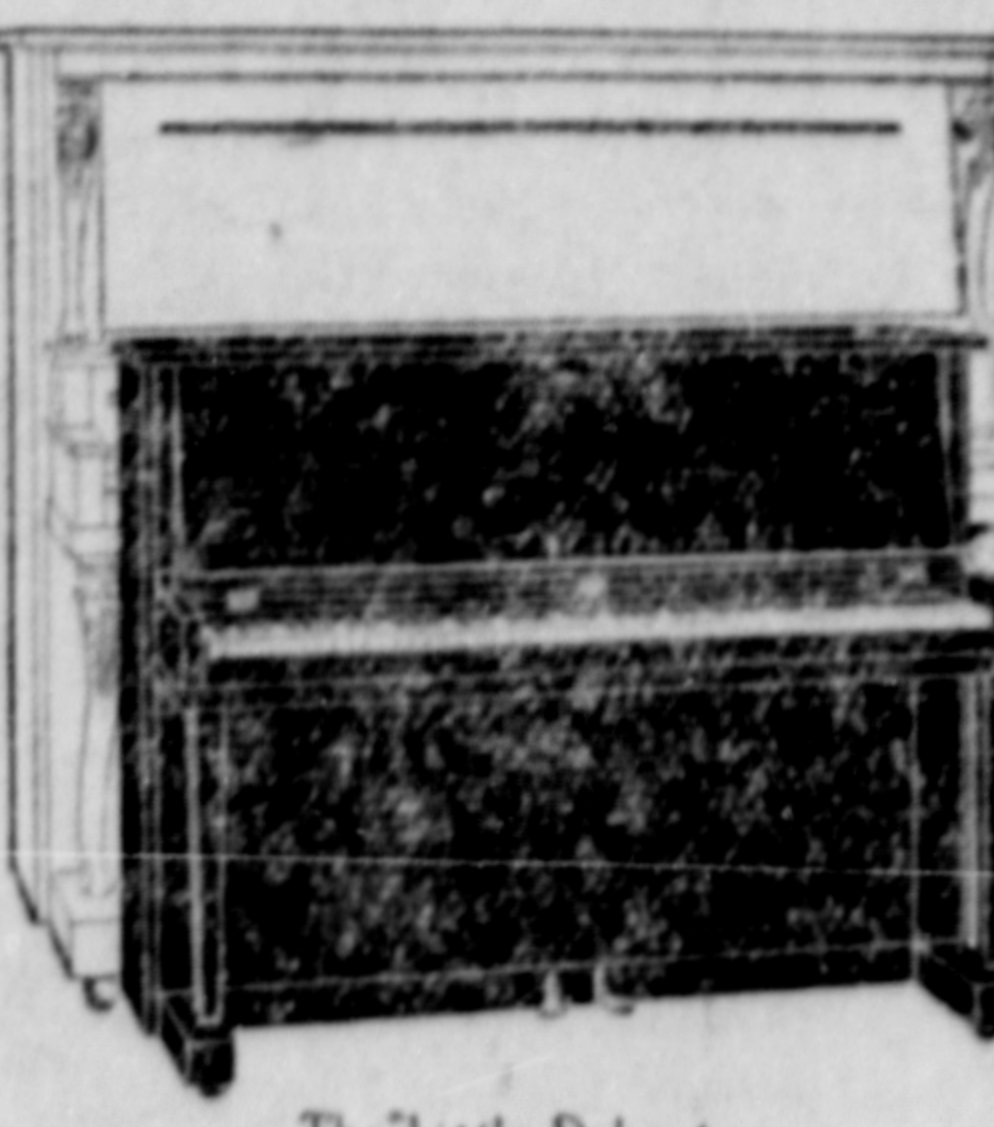
