Strenuous measure to be adopted by the -Board to bring financial condition of institution to sound financial basis. Over 3,000 behind already this year

The finances of the General Hospital are in a parlous state. Already this year during the first eight months the institution has run behind over \$3,000 and the debt is piling up as a result. This was reported at the meeting of the Hospital Board last night and it was decided to take strenuous measures to put the finances of the institution on a sound basis. With this in view the following recommendations of the Finance Committee were adopted by the Board:

1 .- That the rates for private wards be increased from \$20 and \$25 to \$25 and \$35 respectively.

2.—That we petition the City Council to make the city grant on a basis of 70c. per day per patient treated in the hospital.

3.—That the Tite Ward be used as a semi-private ward and The I INDUITED when so used a rate of \$3 a day be charged patients.

4.—That the Hospital take immediate steps to enforce the collection of all outstanding accounts.

. 5 .- That the annual membership fee be increased to \$5 and that a strong effort be made to obtain a large membership.

6 .- That while the hospital is greatly in need of paint, it is Copenhagen, Sept. 26.—It is not recommended that the painting be done at the present time local people rather resent the idea reported from Stockholm that under the present financial conditions.

7.—That the eaves be repaired or renewed on the new wing. Before the adoption of this report a financial report was presented by the secretary which showed that the finances were steadily becoming more involved and that some steps must be aken at once to right them.

City Do Share.

Application has already been made to the provincial government for an increased grant, but it was also felt by members of the board that the city would have to do its share as it was the more interested.
