Operating Room In Edmonton Hospital Expected to Be Re-Opened Soon

EDMONTON, Dec. 9:-While Dr. A. F. Anderson, superintendent of the Royal Alexandra Hospital has handed out an official statement which states that the report from the Investigating Committee which followed the closing down of the operating theatre in the hospital last week, has not yet been completed, it is learned from other sources that the experts engaged on the work of tracing down the streptococcus haemolyticus germs which necessitated this action, has been successful. It is expected that the operating theatre will be reopened at an early adte.

Dr. Anderson's statement indicates that the experts consider they have the situation well in hand, and promises a further statement as soon at the committee's report

Water Connection For New Fishery Floats Decided
