the false assessment:-45% of City lots reverted to City for non-payment of taxes.

Arrears of taxes and accrued interest on them now amounts to \$328,753. Is it worth ten cents on the dollar?

The City cannot sell its bonds, nor can it borrow from any source. It has destroyed its own credit. Why does not the City try telling the truth for a change? it might bring us better luck.
