Texas Widow

In her young womanhood Mrs.
Dodd was a school teacher at
Tyler, Tex. Some years after her
marriage with E. C. Dodd the
husband died. He left her a
tract of land bordering on the Rio
Grande near Laredo. In addition
to being covered with cactus and
mesquite, this land carried a heavy
load of mortgages. At this time
it was thought to be fit only for
grazing land for goats.

Mrs. Dodd, however, concluded
to improve it for an onion farm,
and with the determination of a
woman who means to succeed, she
set about having it cleared and
put under cultivation. Her suc-
cess has been most remarkable

GOOD CLEANING METHOD

Whiting Brightens Mirrors and
Plate Glass

To clean windows and mirrors
tie up some finely powdered whi-
ting in a small piece of muslin and
dab it over the glass thoroughly.
The dirtier the glass is the more
whiting it will take up. Now
smear it smoothly with a damp
rag and when perfectly dry rub
it off with a lather. If alcohol is
used instead of water the whiting
will dry in much less time and the
glass receive a higher polish. The
corners of the panes should receive
particular attention. They are
often left dirty, spoiling the whole
appearance of the window.
