LONDON, Sept. 19: (CP)-Disarmament talks today had taken a serious turn and a special meeting of the British cabinet is summoned for tomorrow to receive a full report on the Paris conversations. Official circles here are extremely reticent over the situation described in some quarters as arising from the French desire for a united front among France, the United Kingdom and United States against Hitlerism in the Geneva disarmament conference which is resuming shortly.



### Secret Forts Guard France On German Border



France's answer to Hitlerism, the threat of monarchical restoration in Germany, and the possibility of a new German invasion is a vast system of military defences which is nearing completion along the Franco-German border after two years of labor and at a reported cost of more than \$300,000,000. At the top is an artist's conception of the secret, underground forts being constructed in the Alsace-Lorraine sector, said by travelers to resemble great white ant hills. The forts are reported so strongly constructed as to resist the heaviest of air bombs.
