She came with a woman friend and motored away immediately when her testimony was concluded. She is staying at a small village on the Yorkshire coast.

A reporter asked her for an explanation of her jilting her fiance. She appealingly said: "Oh, don't ask me anything, let it be forgotten."

HOTELS HAD TO USE CAMP FIRES

Break in Watermain Prevented Kitchen Stoves from Being Used, but Chefs Refused to Be Beaten and Served Excellent Meals.

Consternation reigned in the kitchens of two of the most popular hotels in the city this morning, but the patrons of the dining rooms of these welcoming hostilities would never guess that the substantial and excellent meals served had been cooked under most unusual circumstances over

the camp fire, so to speak, in the hotel yards.

Ballasting operations at the wharf depot had somehow caused a break in the G. T. P. watermain, and the whole supply had to be cut off temporarily to enable repairs to be made. The mishap occurred at the most unfortunate time possible for the cooks, but with all the energy (and some of the language) of true born pioneers, they got busy, kindled camp fires out of doors, and managed to serve the meals triumphantly on time.

The shutting off of the water made it impossible to keep fires going in the stoves in case of boiler explosions. Efforts were made to have the supply restored as quickly as possible.

FORMER CHIEF OF POLICE

J. J. McCarvell Appointed Chief of Detective Department of R. N. W. M. P. and Stationed at Edmonton.

From Edmonton, Alberta, comes the news that J. J. McCarvell, first Chief of Police for the city of Prince Rupert, has been appointed Chief of the Detective Department of the R. N. W. M. P. with his headquarters at Edmonton. Mr. McCarvell was for some time with the Vancouver detective force after resigning his position as chief of police here. He is doing exceedingly well in Edmonton.

FOREST FIRES IN THE PROVINCE

\$500,000 Damage Done at Squahamish Valley—Newport Lumber Co. Have Heavy Loss.

Victoria, July 21.—Forest fires have done \$500,000 damage in the Squahamish Valley and considerable timber was destroyed. The camps of the Newport Timber company have been wiped out. The engines were buried in mud in an effort to save them. No lives were lost.
