

MR. WESTON'S EXPLANATION ON GARBAGE COMPLAINTS

Says His Men Have Authority to Make Extra Charges
Where They Think the Collector Has Not Called
for Several Weeks—Knows Nothing
About a Pig Ranch

In reference to the complaints of citizens about the scavenging system collections, fees, etc., J. C. Weston speaking to a News reporter this morning said that he thought the difficulties complained about resulted from the operations of the old company's collectors endeavoring to collect their last month's levies. He also stated that his own men were authorized to charge extra for the removal of refuse which from its quantity, and apparent staleness they could judge to be the accumulation of six weeks or more. This may have given rise to the complaints about the "fifty cents a call" statement of fees. Mr. Weston remarked that all his employees at present are English-speaking men, but some difficulties might occur through foreign-speaking residents not understanding the language.

Citizens Supply Cans

"It is up to the citizens to supply their own garbage cans," said Mr. Weston. "While the Sanitary Inspector may insist on a particular type of can as suitable, the citizens may select their own provided it is in keeping with the regulations. I am prepared to supply suitable cans at \$1.25 and \$3, the latter being a garbage can." Mr. Weston knows nothing what ever, he says, about a hog ranch being run in conjunction with the garbage scavenging. Hogs which came into the city recently were sent up river. The reason why restaurant garbage is charged less for removal per fifteen gallon can than the garbage of other businesses, according to Mr. Weston is because of the greater frequency of calls necessary on restaurant premises.

WHAT HAPPENED IN DARK WHEN LOCO MET HANDCAR

Inquest on Tom Votisaratos, Killed on Railway While
Riding Without Permission on Handcar—Death
Result of Collision—Whose Whiskey
Was It?

"We, the jury find that deceased Tom Votisaratos came to his death as a result of injuries sustained through the collision of a hand car upon which he, and three others were clandestinely riding from Prince Rupert, and from which he was thrown against the engine of a gravel train approaching from the other direction."

Above is the verdict of the jury on the death of the victim of the hand car accident of Wednesday night. Magistrate McMullin presided over the inquest held on Saturday night. Considerable interest was aroused in this accident, and the Provincial Courtroom was crowded.

Foreman's Story

According to the evidence of John Wilsar, foreman of the section gang, the party had run short of provisions though a supply train had passed up that very day. Wilsar asked the other men George Dinoroatis and Nick Dinoroatis, along with the deceased to come into town on the hand car. They bought bread, and provisions in Rupert, and started back to camp on the hand car. Wilsar declared that a small bottle of soft drink was all the liquor he had seen during the trip. The dead man had the bottle. There was no light on the hand car. The night was rather dark. They were travelling fast, but not so fast as they had been when they came in.

Declared Car Stopped

Of importance in the foreman's

story was his reiteration of the statement that the car was stopped by him immediately he realised the train was ahead. He had thought all traffic was ended for the night, but two lights ahead revealed the oncoming train travelling tender first. Wilsar heard no whistle, but said that he applied the hand car brakes, stopped the car, shouted to his mates to jump, and himself ran twenty feet forward before the car was hit by the engine. This account was not fully corroborated by the other men on the car, though it was evident that efforts had been made to stop the car. The foreman admitted that he had no right to take the car without permission.

Bottle of Whiskey

Evidence was given by Dr. Eggert showing that deceased had died of fracture of the skull. Then George Dinoroatis who had also travelled on the hand car told his story. He had not heard the section foreman tell him to jump, and maintained that the hand car was moving when the accident happened. The foreman tried to put on the brakes though. Witness mentioned a bottle of whisky which was found on the line after the accident. The bottle, he said, belonged to the foreman who had put it wrapped in his coat on to the hand car just before starting from Rupert. Witness was mixed about the lights shown by the tender of
