May Roberts and Company
Give Good Performance of
"The Thief."

The tragedy of a woman, driven to desperation to retain the admiration of her husband, so that she steals to buy fine clothes and jewels wherewith to adorn herself, that is the sensational theme on which Henri Bernstein developed his drama, "The Thief." The dramatic episode is intensified by the action of Walter Gardner, a youthful admirer of the wife, who in vain assumes the guilt. But in the end the truth is made clear. The youth is exonerated, the erring wife forgiven, and her heart set at rest.

The play—rather an ambitious one for a repertoire company to attempt on its first night in Prince Rupert—was given last night by the May Roberts Company in the Empress Theatre. Miss Roberts took the part of the distraught Marie Willoby, "the thief," and gave a very creditable performance. In the second act, by far the strongest in the piece, both she and Mr. L. Victor Gillard as the husband played with great intensity and strength. The unmasking of the wife's crime by the steady questioning of the husband, the woman's pathetic efforts to turn the subject, and the horror of the final exposure were splendidly portrayed, and won spontaneous applause. The support was quite good, and the piece well staged. Miss Roberts' gowns came in for a great deal of attention from the ladies of the audience.

During the final "wait," Mr. Gillard pleased the audience with a fine rendition of Service's dramatic poem "The Killing of Dan McGrew," and Mr. Ira Robertson brought down the house with a capital comic song and humorous monologue.

The company will put on the pretty comedy "The Marriage of Kitty" tonight.

Likes Rupert

Mr. Richard S. Ford, managing director of the Vancouver "Saturday Sunset" was a caller at the Daily News office yesterday. He is paying a flying visit up the coast as far as Skagway in company with Mr. W. Phillips of Melbourne, Australia. Both gentlemen were much impressed with the scenic beauties of the surrounding country, and the progress in city-making they saw in Prince Rupert.

FORT GEORGE
IS NOW "DRY"

The Hotel Northern the Only Hotel in the District, Goes up in Flames.

Fort George, July 25.—The total destruction by fire of the Hotel Northern at South Fort George last Saturday morning has made the district "dry" as far as licensed premises are concerned, and it is altogether improbable that another license will be granted this year. With the burning of Hotel Northern the liquor license granted by the provincial government lapsed. Before a new license can be granted all the requirements of the liquor act must be complied with, and as this would mean the erection of a building with large public accommodations it is scarcely possible that such a structure could be provided within a year even were the parties interested so inclined.

Johnson & Burns, proprietors of Hotel Northern, suffered over \$20,000 loss in the destruction of their property.

S.S. PRINCE JOHN ARRIVES

New G. T. P. Steamer for Island Trip will be in Vancouver Tomorrow.

Word was received at the office of the Grand Trunk Pacific yesterday that their new steamer, the Prince John, would arrive in Vancouver Thursday. The captain gave his position early yesterday as abreast of San Diego, giving the first information by wireless of her position since her departure from England. The vessel is sailing at the rate of between ten and twelve knots.

The steamer will be in Prince Rupert within a few days of her arrival at Vancouver.
