Port Burwell, Aug. 3.—Rivalry
between the Dominion Natural
Gas Company and the Medina
Natural Gas Company has resulted
in a reported offer of one of the
companies to give gas users of
Vienna and Port Burwell not only
free gas, but also a premium of
one cent per thousand feet to all
those who will sign a contract for
one year.

Since the war between the two
companies started the price of
gas has been cut in half, dropping
from twenty cents per thousand
feet to ten cents. The latest offer
to pay the citizens for using the
gas is the result of one company's
offer to supply it free. Both
companies have franchises in Vi-
enna and Port Burwell.

GET THROUGH
IN TWO YEARSLine will Reach Ottawa in That
Time, Says Mr. Chamberlin

Ottawa, Aug. 3.—"The Grand
Trunk Pacific line ought to be
through Ottawa in two years,"
said Mr. E. J. Chamberlin, general
manager, who is in town after a
tour of inspection over the line in
the west.

"The work west is getting along
splendidly," he said. "I was out
to the Rockies on a visit of in-
spection, and I found that marked
progress was being made at every
point of the line. We are somewhat
troubled on this side by a scarcity
of labor; we could do with 3,000
men, but in the west we have all
the laborers we want."

Remarkable Advance in Wom-
an's Life in the Orient

Among Japanese high school
graduates the desire for receiving
further education is strong today,
writes a Japanese teacher. The
Japanese girl of this generation
has breathed the air of compara-
tive freedom from her birth. Old
dogmas and precepts which gov-
erned the lives of her mother and
grandmother fall upon her ear
like far-off thunder—not threaten-
ing, but as something remote and
little to be regarded. Although it
is commonly said that woman's
education in Japan has advanced
with wonderful rapidity within the
last twenty-five years, it is also
undoubtedly true that woman's
educational opportunities are not
so great as those of men. But,
says this teacher, the time is full
of hope for women.

on the night of July 10. He says
he went to the house and killed
Coble and then his wife, afterwards
assaulting her.

NEW "TUNNEL"
POWER BOATHas Just Left Her Builders'
Hands in Rupert for Voyage
up the Skeena Where She will
Ferry Passengers. Clever De-
vice.

On her way up the Skeena
River at present is the new "tun-
nel" power boat Kit-ex-Chen ("Me-
nel" power boat Kit-ex-Chen
("Men of the Skeena") belonging to
Mr. W. J. O'Neill and finished on
Sunday at H. Johnson's yard at
Cow Creek. The boat is a very
interesting one. She is the first
tunnel sterned boat built in this
city, and is so designed, as river
boat men know, in order that the
propeller may have more water
about it when the boat is making
trips over shallows. She draws
only eight inches of water, yet by
the stern tunnel device which
lifts shaft and propeller up into
the body of the boat as it were,
she can use a twenty-four inch
propeller. Her speed accordingly,
is ten miles per hour with a 30
H. P. Ralaco engine. The Kit-
ex-Chen is 34 feet long and can
carry 20 passengers. Her work
will be passenger ferrying between
the bridge and Hazelton on the
Skeena. On her way up now she
is carrying about 100 cases of
gasoline for consumption during
her work this fall.
