GREENVILLE, November 29: After waiting almost three hours in a misty drizzle, with a cold wind blowing down river, the community of Greenville had the pleasure of seeing the two Church Army evangelists arrive from Aiyansh, accompanied by two speedboats which had previously been despatched upriver as an escort.
