Instead of approving the social
bureau proposed by Miss Char-
lotte McKeon, secretary of the
Chicago Epworth league, members
of the league have denounced it as
a matrimonial bureau and a fan-
tastical idea that was not in harmony
with the principles of society.

Pandemonium broke loose at the
Desplains camp meeting when
Miss McKeon issued a call for
\$5000 to promote her idea. She
asked the Methodist church to
make the contribution, and when
a storm of protest was raised at
her suggestion she announced that
thousands of girls and young men
would get married in the larger
cities if they only had a chance
to meet each other.

"The church should meet such
a situation," said Miss McKeon,
"I will admit that there may be
more or less doubt and may be
some ridicule. We are prepared
for the world to ridicule the social
bureau as a matrimonial bureau."

ITEMS OF SPORT

Lefty Miller, whom the Victoria
Ball Club was trying to secure
from the Oakland Coast League
team, was grabbed by Tacoma.

The Krupp works' yacht Ger-
mania won the international cup
at Cowes this month, defeating
yachts owned by the Kaiser, King
Alfonso and King George.

When the famous Corinthians
old country footballers strike Cal-
gary about August 26, \$1200 or
\$1400 will be spent in entertaining
them, and of this amount the city
will put up \$200. Dr. H. Ings
and Colonel Pryce-Jones inter-
viewed the city council and in-
duced them to regard their request
for civic assistance favorably.

If the present plans are carried
out there will probably be a
strong track team from the Ed-
monton Y. M. C. A. there, sent
out to the coast this fall, where
they will try conclusions with the
athletes in Vancouver and Victoria.
At any rate the boys are thinking
seriously of making the trip and
they will know for certain in a few
days.

The patent office has issued
a patent to Ben Shibe of Phila-
delphia for a new core for base-
balls. Instead of the cork centre
now in use, Shibe's patent calls
for vitrified rubber and a highly
seasoned wood. It was said the
new plan is the result of experi-
ments wherein it was proved that
the vitrified rubber and wood
core make the ball respond more
readily to the bat, fly more true
and with greater speed.

John M. Ward, the former
baseball star, has appealed to the
U. S. circuit court of appeals from
a decision denying him a new trial
in his suit to recover \$50,000 from
President "Ban" Johnson of the
American league, for slander. Ward
is not satisfied with the \$1,000
verdict awarded him.

Harry Sundberg, former Minne-

invested a \$50,000 legacy in Monta-
na copper mines, winning a
fortune estimated at \$750,000, re-
turned lately from Norway. When
he arrived he found 32 proposals
for marriage, forwarded from the
Hotel Raddisson, Minneapolis, and

"Bill" Lang defeated "Bill" Squires
in the fifth round of a recent
bout at Brisbane, Australia, for
the heavyweight championship of
Australia. Lang weighed in at
190 and Squires at 176 pounds.
The odds were 4 to 1 on Lang, who
had all the best of it throughout.
Four thousand people saw the
bout.

What is believed to be close to
a record was established on Gray's
Harbor in the matter of loading
lumber aboard the California-At-
lantic steamship Stanley Dollar.
She was loaded with 1,400,000
feet of fir in just 51 working hours.
Of this quantity 800,000 feet was
stowed into her hold in 24 hours.

William Giles Jarvis, in his day
considered a fine hurdle race and
steeplechase jockey, who rode four
times in the Grand National, died
at Newmarket recently after a
short illness. Deceased, who was
72 years of age, was an owner and
trainer, having at one time as
many as forty horses in training at
Lambourne.

Many clockers made the time
of Flint Rock's great race at
Fort Erie faster than the official
figures. Outside watches gave
the time for the mile and a six-
teenth as 1.44, which would be
close to the record for America.
The present American record is
1.43 3-5, by Gretna Green at
Fort Erie two years ago.
