

INTERESTING ADDRESS GIVEN BY PAST PRESIDENT OF PRESS GALLERY

TORONTO, March 22. - (Canadian) Press Despatch). - "Parliamentary Reporting in Canada" was the topic chosen by Arthur R. Ford, managing editor of the London (Ont.) Free Press, speaking at the Sigma Delti Chi journalistic lecture course of the University of Toronto. Mr. Ford, who is a past president of the Ottawa Press Gallery, said in part:-

"The Canadian Parliamentary Press Gallery consists of from 25 to 30 accredited newspapermen, the great majority representing Canadian newspapers and The Canadian Press, Canada's cooperative news gathering organization, with an odd representative of the weekly or magazine press. About half of these correspondents are permanently located all the year round at Ottawa and between sessions, cover the news of the government and the departments at Ottawa.





PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. and by aftens on declaring intention to become British subjects condidonal upon residence, occapation, and improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge ty addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be For more detailed information see

Bulletin "How to Pre-empt PURCHASE

Applications are received for pur-

chase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands.' Mill, factory, or industrial sites on

timber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20

acres, may be leased as homesites. conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed. LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company. GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts Commissioner. Grazing Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners.
