Cleaning Fine Curtains

DETECTING HUMAN BLOOD

New Process by Which Blood Stains May be Identified

An incident may be recalled of an attempt being made in the early history of Winnipeg, when a young man in the mill on the banks of the Red River decamped, and tried to cover his tracks by sprinkling from the mill to the river drops of blood of a chicken, hoping this to be mistaken for human blood, and thus lead to the inference that he had been murdered and thrown into the river. By the use of the microscope it was easy to distinguish between the shape of the blood corpuscles of the man and of the bird. But a much graver question comes when the distinction is sought between the blood of man and that of some other member of the mammalia, such as the horse or dog or pig.

A new test of great perfection has now been found which is in use in the Serological laboratories. This is called the precipitate test. By this immunized rabbit's serum is taken after being acted on by the blood reaction and it will give a distinct cloud in a test tube with human blood, but with no other. We have said with no other. This is scarcely correct as it is stated that the blood of the ape is included in this test and cannot be distinguished from the human. In the same way it is said that the blood of the horse and the ass cannot by this test be distinguished from one another. In this test it is essential that the test shall be free from bacterial impurity or indeed from any other foreign substance. Blood stains on clothing can now be distinguished with great certainty.

Eastern Bettors Favor This as Result of Election

Several Vancouver people who have been inquiring by telegraph from friends in the East have been advised that the weight of betting in Montreal, Toronto, and other places on the election result is that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be returned to power.
