Commerce Advocated—Would Give Workers Better Return and Protect Consumers From Profiteers

OTTAWA, April 12: (CP)-Long steps in the direction of state control of industry and commerce motivated by the twin objectives of assuring workers and primary producers larger return for their work and of protecting consumers against profiteering were recommended in the report of the royal commission on price spreads and mass buying which was tabled in the

House of Commons today. The key DINNER OF point of the majority report is the DINNER OF setting up of a federal trade and industry commission composed of five members, a semi-autonomous; body clothed with wide powers of supervision, regulation, arbitration and investigation and serving as an . advisory body to the government on all matters relating to trade and industry.

Reduction of the hours of work vincial legislation.

Improved and more strictly enforced minimum wage laws are proposed.

Sweeping changes in company laws and methods of livestock mar keting are also proposed.

A fisheries control board would have the general object of benefitting fishermen and fish-eaters by eliminating unsound trade practices and cut-throat competition and improving methods of handling, marketing and processing of

A limited fund for the extension of credit to fishermen for purchase or repair of equipment, gear, etc. is suggested.

Unless flour milling companies write down their capital structures and capital valuations of their surplus capacity, they are faced with bankruptcies, the report says.

A minority report was presented by E. J. Young, Liberal member for Weyburn. It has as its main recommendations lowered tariffs, increased foreign markets and less government interference with busi-
