Alderman Newton: "Then who should be held responsible?"

Some desultory discussion followed during which Alderman Newton declared himself done with the thing, and sat silent. Then the talk led to Acting Mayor Hilditch saying:

"I myself told the purchasing agent to make no more purchases until I had seen the requisition."

Instantly Alderman Newton woke up. "Then why don't you get rid of the office of purchasing agent altogether?" he demanded. He asked why the attempt made months ago to have the city purchases systematised through a duly authorised purchasing agent, had been neglected.

Acting Mayor Hilditch said there was one thing he saw in favor of the system in vogue at present, and that was its great mittee. freedom from red tape. He said they had never yet had cause to question a single order made, and the discussion there was allowed to drop.
