

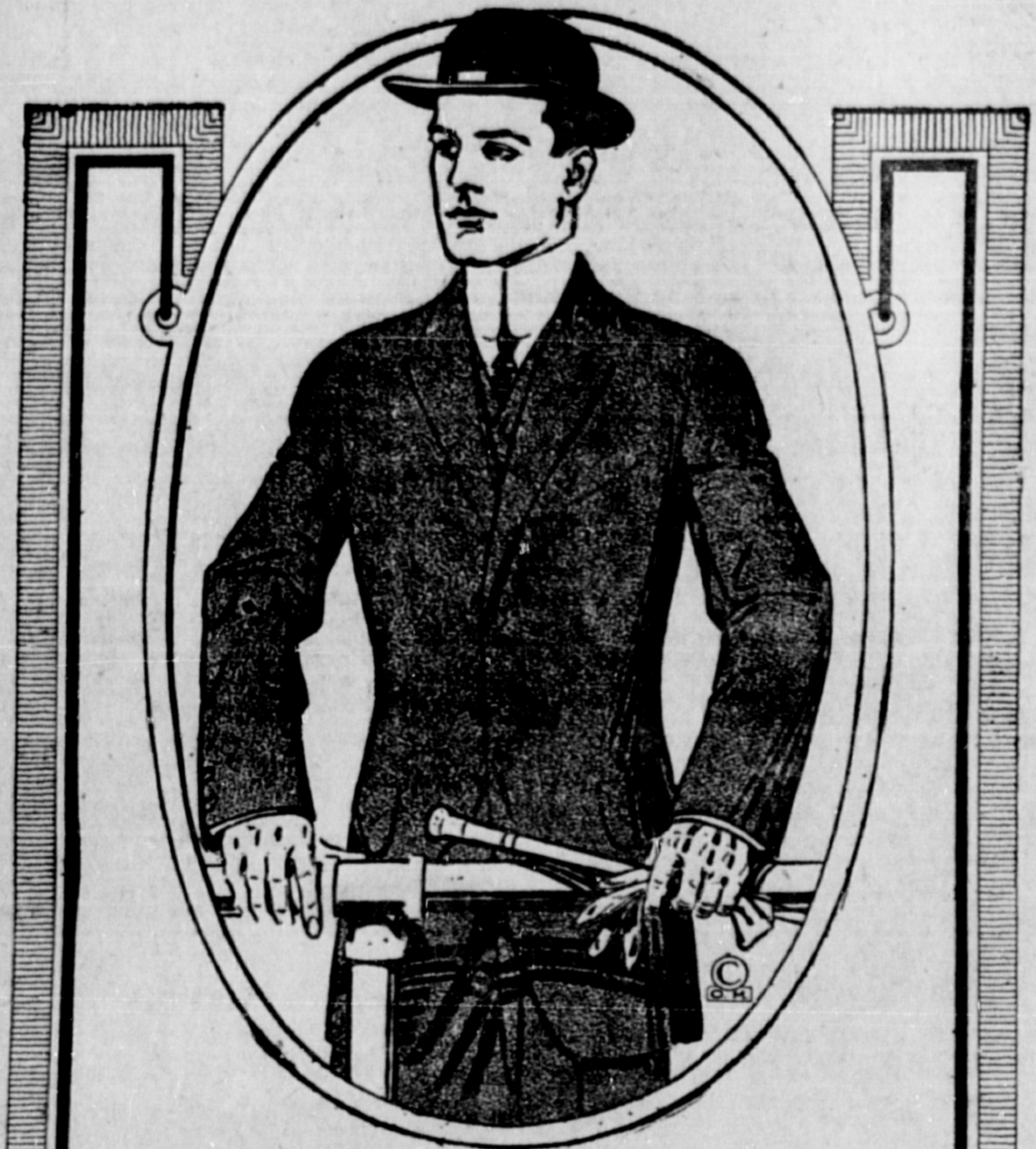

## FUND FOR ALASKA ROAD AGREED UPON

Conferees Settle on \$35,000,000 Appropriation and Give President Broad Powers

Washington, March 4.—The conference committee on the Alaska railroad has agreed practically upon every phase of the bill. The senate conferees have accepted the house amendment providing for \$35,000,000 instead of \$40,000,000, but two million instead of one million is made available immediately. The senators also accepted the house amendments doing away with an issue of bonds, and the bill when finally passed will appropriate the \$35,000,000 directly from the treasury.

The house conferees receded from the amendment requiring the president to purchase any connecting line of railroad before work on the new system is started. The senate provision, which gives the president broad discretionary powers in the matter, was accepted.

Giving the president full discretionary powers in the matter of buying or leasing such railway lines as the government railroad may connect with is advantageous. It has been suggested that the president might consider it feasible to lease one of the existing lines and to expend the appropriation for additional mileage. By making it compulsory to buy one of the Alaska railroads was considered a likely source of lawsuits, which would delay the road building for years.

Under the present provisions of the bill, should President Wilson find some railroad unwilling to sell, or to lease, he could build a parallel line or start from a new terminal.
