Prepare for War

While Hoping for Peace.

It is not wise to be too optimistic over the peace talk. Lloyd's is charging a rate of only forty per cent. on insurance against the risk of a business being ruined by the coming of peace before the end of the year. That seems to indicate that they think the odds are against peace by that time. They offer a rate of sixty per cent. against peace by March next.

All are hoping for peace but there is an opinion prevalent that the Germans started their peace drive in the hope that the Allies would let them get back into their own country while the conference was going on, but that they had no idea of agreeing to the terms which they knew would be imposed. The only way to work for peace is to fight like demons and to pay like men. Victory bonds will be on the market soon and it is hoped it will be the last chance there will be to buy them.

Fishermen Want

Float at Once.

There is a letter on another page from a fisherman who asks that The News keep up the agitation for a float until it meets with success. That was exactly what we intended to do. The writer expresses himself rather crudely perhaps, but he seems to know what he wants. It is not literature he is thinking about, but a float. The matter is one for serious consideration and is not to be dismissed lightly. If the float is really needed, and that seems to be the unanimous opinion of the fishermen, then it should be built at once and no obstacles should be put in the way of the carrying on of the work. Suitable dockage for the fishermen's boats is an essential in a fishing town.

Out of Holy Land.

Many of those who look at the Holy Land through the spectacles of holy writ and the beautiful pictures of spotless robes as shown in the Sunday schools, will be glad to know that the Hun is being driven from the sacred places and that the ruthless Turk will defile them no more. Allenby is doing great work. He is taking no chances but steadily he is moving northward with his army.

It must not be imagined however that he is leaving behind him a beautiful land. A correspondent writing from Jerusalem says that it is a filthy place, and the same is true of many of the other cities which as children appealed to us. Filth, beggary, poverty, defile the Holy Cities and it will take a long time to bring them back to a condition which will appeal to the religious visitor.

Women Should

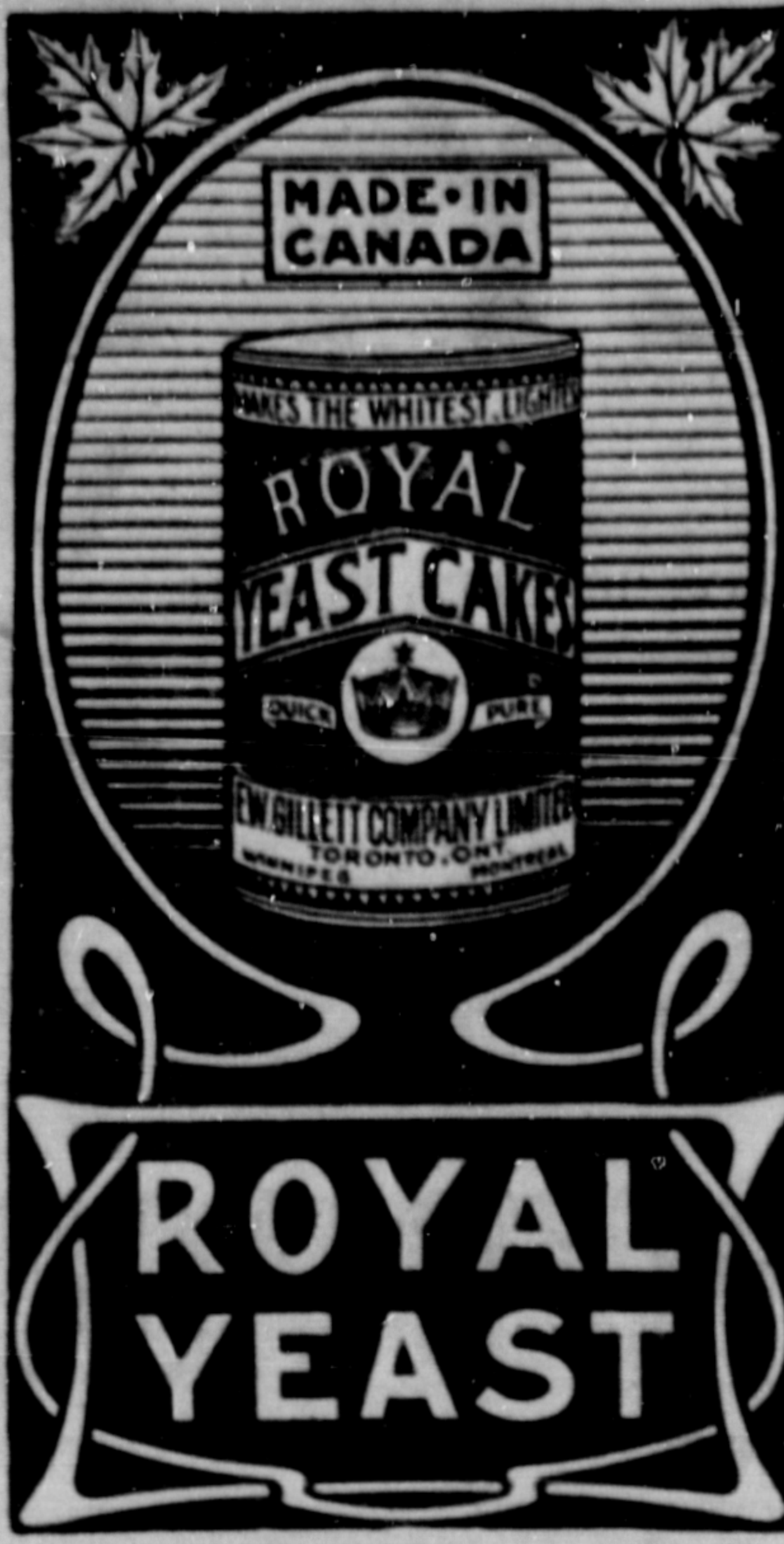
Prepare to Vote.

Women must not forget that they now have the right to vote and that before long they will be called upon to exercise the franchise. The Dominion Government was elected for the period of the war, and soon after peace is declared it must be expected that there will be another election. Now is the time to prepare for this. Women as well as men should keep themselves informed on all matters of public interest in order that when the time comes they will be enabled to vote intelligently and not as their husbands tell them.

This is written with no idea of stirring up political turmoil. It is not wise, especially at a time like this, to set one party against another. The idea is to follow the course of events with care and from those, rather than from newspaper editorials, to form opinions on public questions which are free from bias and dogmatism.

It is often said that women are unable to reason, and that they trust to intuition rather than to reason, and there is a measure of truth in the saying. Women often say they know because they know, rather than from any reason which they are able to give. They judge a person from an impression which they are unable to analyze. It is a common thing for a woman to say "that man is not honest," or "that woman is not truthful." Why, she does not know. She feels it. The impression is conveyed by intuition rather than from reasoning.

Women are much more impressionable than men and are more easily swayed by emotion. That is one reason why some people doubted if it would be wise to give them the franchise. As was often said during the women's rights campaign "she cannot do much worse than men have done and she will probably do better."

TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Nathan Louis Lando and Dora Scheinman as owners in Fee under two Tax Sale Deeds from the Collector of the City of Prince Rupert, bearing date the 24th day of November, 1917, of ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcels or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, more particularly known and described as Lot eleven (11), Block twenty-five (25), Section seven (7), and Lot thirteen (13), Block thirty-five (35), Section eight (8), Map 923. You are required to contest the claim of the tax purchaser within 35 days from the date of the service of this notice (which may be effected by publication in the Daily News, and your attention is called to section 36 of the "Land Registry Act" with amendments, and to the following extract therefrom:—

"and in default of a caveat or certificate of its pendency being filed before the registration as owner of the person entitled under such tax sale, all persons so served with notice, and those claiming through or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of any unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by descent whose title is not registered under the provisions of this Act, shall be forever estopped and debarred from setting up any claim to or in respect of the land so sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes."

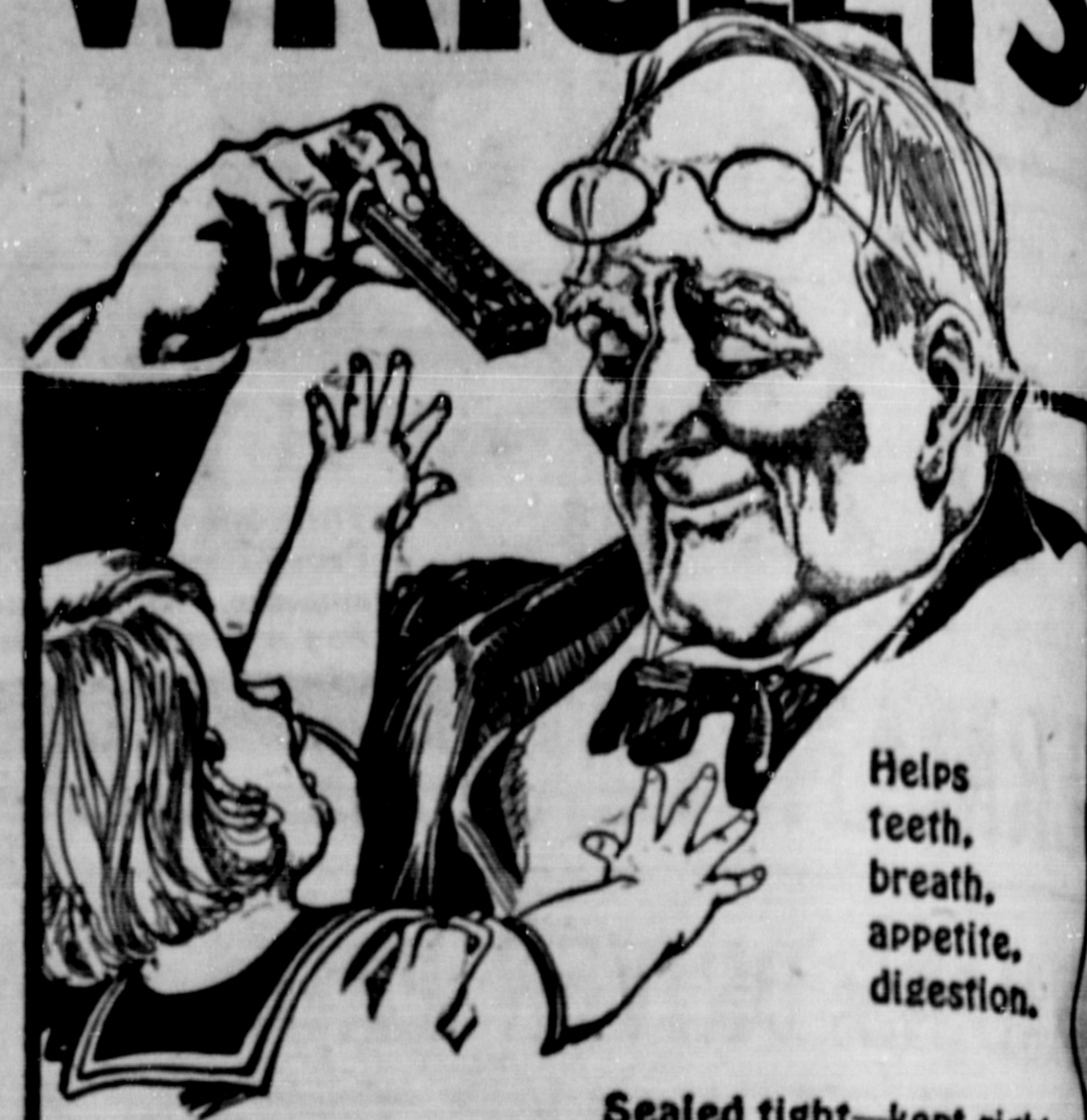
