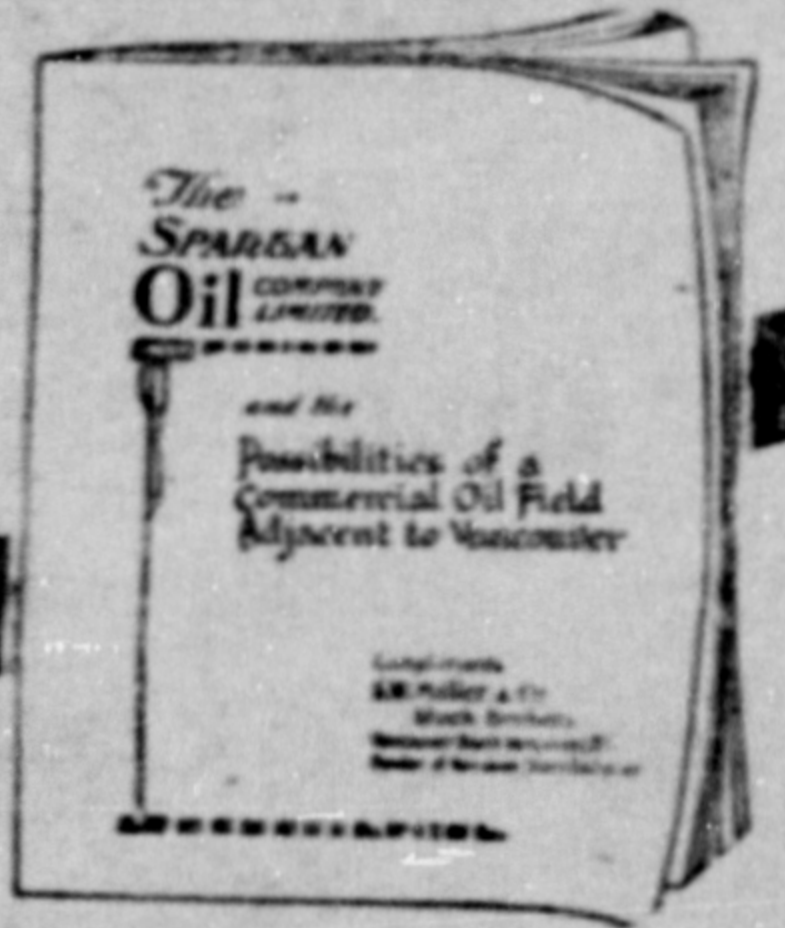

ECONOMIC AID WILL BE GIVEN RUSSIA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, October 18.—At the direction of President Wilson economic aid will be extended to Russia, through the agency of the War Trade Board. This policy is the outcome of Inter-Allied determination to support the military movement of the Czech-Slovaks in Siberia, broadened to rehabilitate sections of Russia friendly to the Allies and re-establish the eastern front.
