THE NORTHERN**Great Steamship Company Will  
Co-operate in Dominion Trade  
with Canadian Northern Rail-  
way—Steamers in Connection.

Montreal, Feb. 8.—A cable message was received from London today which reads:

"There is a report, which is regarded as authoritative, that the Cunard and Canadian Northern Steamship Companies will work together from Bristol."

Enquiries at the Montreal offices of the two companies establish the fact that the cable report is substantially true. Though not yet officially confirmed, it would appear, therefore, that the Cunard boats will soon be leaving Bristol on dates arranged with the Canadian Northern, instead of making Southampton and London their home port, as at present. The working arrangement will, of course, only affect Cunard boats on the Canadian line, and not those on the run between Liverpool and New York.
