Germany Erects One Six Hundred or less. Feet for Wireless from Which to Communicate Direct with New York City.

Berlin, Feb. 14.-At Nauen, which is close to Berlin, a wireless telegraphy station has been established on a tower, which, tower in Paris, is declared to tower was originally 300 feet more or less. high, but in order to increase the range of the wireless station, i was decided to add another superstructure of 300 feet.

It is possible to communicate from the tower direct to New York.
