### PREPARING FOR M'BRIDE'S VISIT.

Premier McBride and the other representative of the Two-Man government are expected to reach here on their stumping campaign the week after next, and there was a rumor around G. VUKOVICH. town today that the Conservatives were circulating a petition reuesting the Premier to pledge himself to an early sale of the government lots in this townsite. It could not be learned which of the two Conservative organizations was doing this, nor could a copy of any such petition be run down. So possibly it is the first of a series of political canards.

The idea, however, has a good deal to recommend it, for the reason that it would be a movement bound from its inception to meet with success. Mr. McBride's reply is a safe bet. He would solemnly and very respectfully take the matter under advisement and give the petitioners an answer at the earliest possible date. That date would be just before election, when SECOND - AVENUE the "promise" would be published in large type. If this should really happen The News would also use large type. It would print this "promise" at the head of a long list of such "promises" of the Two-Man government as to the early completion of the Little's NEWS government dock.

The rumor run yesterday that the petitioners were to present at the same time an ultimatum: That if the petition was not favorably answered the Conservatives of the city would withdraw their support of the McBride government. It may or may not be within the ethics of party politics to hold up a premier with a loaded gun of this description, but to us it is another evidence that the rumor has not foundation in fact. Yet, the 1836 Progressives are really progressive, and might take such a step, as they have taken several, because the question at issue is a supreme matter of public polity. But the old Conservative party -never in your life; forget it. The policy engraved in their heart of hearts is: "Suck the pap hard and silently; never breathe a whisper."


