SENSATION OF HUMBOLDT CASE

Robbery of the Ninety-six Thousand Dollars in Gold Bullion Was Effected While Boat Lay at Prince Rupert.

Seattle, Feb. 29.—The arrest of a Seattle saloon keeper in whose place the \$96,000 gold bullion robbery from the steamship Humboldt in August, 1910, was planned, is momentarily expected as the result of a confession by James Barrett, one of the five persons directly implicated. Barrett, Orville Cavaness and a woman known to the police under various names went to Skagway, where they met the Humboldt and returned on her. The Humboldt put into Prince Rupert southbound on August 10, 1910. After leaving that port, while the woman kept the purser engaged, the two men entered his office, carrying suit cases laden with lead bars. With pincers they drew the nails from the lids of the treasure boxes, removing the \$96,000 in gold bars and substituting the lead. Then they replaced the lids and the nails, took the gold to their staterooms and put it in steamer trunks, and the robbery was undetected until the boxes were opened at the assay offices.

EDITOR HELD FOR LIBEL

Fort George Newspaperman Committed for Trial for Alleged Libel of Natural Resources Security Company.

Fort George, Feb. 26.—Before Government Agent Herne, sitting as police magistrate, on Saturday, J. B. Daniell, editor of the South Fort George Herald, was committed to trial at the Clinton assizes on a charge of criminal libel.

For some time Daniell has been conducting a campaign in his weekly paper against the Natural Resources Security Company, Limited, and Fort George townsite, controlled and promoted by that company. His personal attack on the president of the company is the basis of the present proceedings. The accused was admitted to bail in \$5,000.

WAY THE WIND IS BLOWING WITH THE CHURCH UNION VOTE

REPORTS ON THE VERDICT OF CHURCHES HERE, THERE AND EVERYWHERE SHOWING THE TREND OF THE PEOPLE'S MINDS THROUGHOUT CANADA.

Stratford—The session of Knox Presbyterian Church has announced the result of the vote on church union, showing 459 ballots in favor and 119 opposed. This vote is complete. St. Andrew's vote will be completed next week.

Belleville—The quarterly board of Bridge Street Methodist Church met last night and voted on church union, the result being twenty-three for and one against.

The quarterly board of Holloway Street Church also voted last night, fourteen for and two against.

Newcastle—The official board of the Orono Methodist circuit voted on the question of church union, twenty-two for and two against it.

Millbrook—The vote of the official board of the Methodist Church showed seventeen in favor and one opposed to the union of the churches.

The vote of the official board of the Cavan Methodist circuit showed the twenty-two members unanimously in favor of union.

Milverton—At the meeting of the quarterly official board here, the vote on the basis of church union was taken and stood thirteen against and nine for.

Pictou—At a meeting of the official board of Adolphustown circuit held at Hayburn a vote was taken on union and resulted

thirteen for and none against. Adolphustown circuit is the real cradle of Methodism in Canada, the first church there being now over a century old.

Hespeler—St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Hespeler, completed the vote on church union last Sunday. The vote stands as follows: For, 170; against, 31.

Plattsburgh—At a meeting of the quarterly official board of the Methodist Church here the vote on church union was as follows: In favor, fifteen; against, none.

Binscarth—The report on the vote in connection with church union, somewhat incomplete, was submitted to the Presbytery of Minnedosa, Man., and showed 1,299 votes for and 59 against.

Montreal—The vote on church union at St. Matthew's Presbyterian Church shows 193 communicants against the proposed union and 97 in favor of it.

Montreal—Westminster Presbyterian Church has voted in favor of church union as follows: Session, five to one; communicants, eighty-eight to nine; adherents, fifteen to two.

Great Scheme to Raise Half Million Dollars for Y. M. C. A. in London, England, Fell Flat Owing to Prejudice.

The attempt to raise 400,000 pounds sterling to clear the building fund of the new London Y. M. C. A. has resulted in getting only 66,677 pounds. Charles S. Ward, who has been engaged in raising the money, said with regard to his failure to do so: "The fact is that there has been a fundamental hindrance to our attainment of the goal. The ghost of Exeter Hall has haunted us all through the twelve days. The people here have an ingrained idea that the Y. M. C. A. stands for that bygone conception of aggressive Christianity, namely, that we must go about asking people in unnatural tones of voice and with wearied expressions: 'Are you on the Lord's side?'"

THOUSANDS OF MEN WANTED

Railway Building Calls for Fifty or Sixty Thousand.

The railway companies are now faced with the problem of securing between fifty and sixty thousand men to carry out the vast development programs mapped out by the companies in the Canadian west during the summer of 1912. The works to be undertaken this year are greater than ever before and it is doubtful whether the supply will nearly meet the demand. The G. T. P. and C. N. R. are willing to take on all they can possibly get, as both companies are desirous of rushing through their main lines to completion.

News of the discovery of the South Pole is expected to reach London at any moment and already the newspapers are beginning to discuss the chances of the rival expeditions of Captain Ronald Amundsen and Captain R. N. Scott.

TWO LINES FOR GROUNDHOG

Both Canadian Northern and Grand Trunk Pacific Are Applying for Charters—Former to Build Line from Stewart.

Applications for two railway charters into the Groundhog coal basin will be made in the course of a few days to the legislature, according to report. Messrs. Mackenzie & Mann, head of the Canadian Northern Railway, are to apply for a charter for a line to run from Stewart. This will be about 90 miles long. The Grand Trunk Railway is to apply for a charter to run from Hazelton northward to the basin, a distance of about 150 miles.

Information to the above effect was disclosed at the recent meeting of the western branch of the Canadian Mining Institute. Should Sir Donald Mann's application be favored it would undoubtedly mean extension of the fourteen mile railway now constructed from the town of Stewart, at the head of the Portland Canal, up Bear River valley.
