Expert Confirms Reports of Marvelous Swimming by Kahanamoku

Jamison Handy, of the Chicago Athletic Association, former one-mile swimming champion and record holder of America, who recently returned from a trip around the world, con firmed the cabled news of the sensational sprinting performances of Duke Kahanamoku of Honolulu, and expressed the opinion that the times credited to the Hawaiian are in no way exaggerated

Handy describes Kahanamoku as a giant, ebony-skinned native about twenty years old, standing over six 1911 | feet in stockings, weighing about 190 pounds, and a magnificent specime of manhood, straight, well-muscled, and perfectly formed. 

TRAINING LESS STRENUOUS

So Says Lawson Robertson, Famous

Trainer and Coach At a recent gathering of certain members of the athletic fraternity of New York, I awson Robertson, train r and coach of the Irish-American Club. to train as diligently for indoor running as they do when they are prepar-

ing to compete in the open.

"There is a very logical reason for making this statement," he said, "but first it must be understood that when I say sprinters I do not include any vho run more than 150 yards. Above that distance it is largely a test of endurance as well as speed, and therefore those runners must train just as diligently for running on the board floors as if they were conditioning themselves for races on cinder paths. "In the first place, one of the most serious things sprinters have to combat is the wind. Indoors, of course, there is no wind, and, since speed is not impaired by any outside force, so much energy is not required. Then too, there is more elasticity to boa floors than there is to cinder paths Another reason is the fact that the runner does not have to take into con sideration weather conditions. 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
