dence, 1912.**ATHLETICS SPOIL****WOMEN'S FIGURES**A Declaration of Artists Who Have  
Excited Hot Discussion in  
EnglandThe deterioration in the beauty of  
woman's figure, consequent upon the  
present craze for athletics, is excit-  
ing a hot controversy in England,  
while medical men are condemning in  
strong terms the modern girl's over-  
indulgence in hockey.The discussion has arisen out of the  
declaration of Louis Potier, the well-  
known American sculptor, that the  
changes in the female form have been  
so great that woman does not now in  
any way resemble the Greek type.Consequently English artists are find-  
ing it more and more difficult to find  
suitable models. "The new figure,"  
says a well-known associate of the  
Royal Academy, "is full of knotty  
bunches of muscles instead of soft,  
fleshy curves, and though this mus-  
cular development is beautiful in man  
it is not so in woman. To the artist  
the over-developed woman is an  
atrocity in the aesthetic sense."The result is that artists and sculp-  
tors now have to rely more on her  
creative ability than ever before. As  
Frank Brangwyn points out, it is still  
possible to get models who are per-  
fectly developed, but the supply is  
running short.A far more serious objection to the  
growing athleticism of woman comes  
from physicians and women presi-  
dents of girls' colleges."Hockey is neither healthy nor  
graceful," said the head of a great  
London girls' school. "A growing girl  
who plays this game for an hour, four  
or five days a week, is almost bound  
to show curvature of the spine after  
a year or so."One of the best medical experts also  
declares that "the tendency at hockey  
is to put strain on the muscles that  
ought not to be trained in young girls  
and women." But such games as cric-  
ket, lacrosse, and tennis are favored  
by most authorities when played in  
moderation.The outcry in England is not against  
physical exercise for women, but  
against the undue indulgence in it.  
Keen observers of present-day tend-  
encies interpret woman's too hearty  
indulgence in manly sports as tend-  
ing to produce a sexless girl, flat  
footed, and ungraceful. This, say the  
critics, is due to the craving of "the  
gentler sex" for complete equality  
with men, and accounts for the grow-  
ing indifference to household duties  
noticeable in certain sections of  
modern Englishwomen.**SUGGESTION FOR MOTORISTS****IN BIG EUROPEAN CITIES.****STOP****Turning****Corner or****Backing****Look Out****Danger****Ahead****TRAINING LESS STRENUOUS**So Says Lawson Robertson, Famous  
Trainer and CoachJamison Handy, of the Chicago Ath-  
letic Association, former one-mile  
swimming champion and record hol-  
der of America, who recently returned  
from a trip around the world, con-  
firmed the cable news of the sensa-  
tional sprinting performances of Duke  
Kahanamoku of Honolulu, and ex-  
pressed the opinion that the times cre-  
dited to the Hawaiian are in no way  
exaggerated.Handy describes Kahanamoku as a  
giant, ebony-skinned native about  
twenty years old, standing over six  
feet in stockings, weighing about 190  
pounds, and a magnificent specimen  
of manhood, straight, well-muscled,  
and perfectly formed. He swims a  
smooth, rhythmic crawl stroke very  
much resembling that of Harry He-  
ber of the Illinois Athletic Club, the  
National 50-yard champion and record  
holder, and goes through the water  
with shoulders high above the surface,  
moving at fast speed.In last year's championship, Kahan-  
amoku won both the 50 and 100 yards  
times, covering the shorter distance in  
24 1-5 seconds and the longer in  
55 2-5 seconds, over a straightaway  
open-water course. The century mark  
established new world's figures which  
are likely to be recognized as a stan-  
dard for four watches agreed on the  
time, and the local authorities intend  
to apply for the record.Enthusiastic supporters of aquatic  
sports in the Hawaiian Islands are so  
anxious to see the new prodigy pitted  
against the world's best sprinters  
that they have subscribed to a purse  
in order to send him to the Olympic  
Games next summer in Sweden, where  
he would represent Uncle Sam in the  
100-meter swim, and unless the cold  
water of the north breaks him to m  
completely, they expect to see him
