During the last two months I have done a great dea of walking about the city and around to the outskirts, and have also put a great deal of time skating at the rink and on the river. I do a little bowling now and then, but not with the heavy finger balls, as I think the strain is too much with that kind. bowl the pony ball, which is light and easily handled, and there is no danger of overtaxing your throwing arm in bowling that kind of a game. have noticed that several ball players whom I know and who did nothing but indoor work during the winter season were in the poorest condition to play baseball in the spring, and for that reason I keep away from the indoor work as much as possible.

This sort of thing will not appeal strongly to the average amateur athite of to-day, who trains constantly with little regard for his studies, who is accustomed to gold watches, god medals, and other valuables or prizes, who is sought after by the rich athletic clubs, and generally lives in cover.

The members of the Federation will have to come from the younger class or the genuine amateur, the athlete who has no desire to make money out of sport. The comeptitions will consist of school boys and young men who have a moderate amount of time to give to athletics, and want to meet rivals of their kind. It is difficult for anyone to take up any sport and have to do his work alone because he has no chance whatever against those who are seen constantly in the meets of the clubs under the control of the Amateur Athletic Union. No athlete. who is really fond of sport, cares to take a big nandicap all the time, and never see even a bronze medal. To excel in any sport one must compite against better men, but one does no maintain interest in any sport o earth when he is constantly in the "also ran" class. The new athleti federation may do good in this repect. It may encourage the yourg sters and bring out some good one from their ranks Athleties are too expensive nonadays, and the federa tion may sicceed in changing this Dr. H. L. Chadwick, athletic director at the Friends' Central School of Philadelphia, for years active in the Y.M.C.A. and A.A.U., and still an official in the latter bady, thinks there is room for both the Union and the Federation. He says: "There is plen ty of work for the federation without in any way interfering with the Ama teur Athletic Union. In the Amateur Athletic Union we have been feeding the amateurs on gold watches so long that the federation way of running athletics will not tempt them to compete. 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
