They Don't Shorten Life, Says Dr.
William Anderson

New York Tribune: Vital statistics
compiled by Dr. William Anderson of
the Yale gymnasium, indicate clearly
that participation in college sports
does not shorten life, as is contended
by some. His investigation covered
no less than 10,929 Yale athletes, from
1855 to the present day, and he con-
cludes an interesting report by say-
ing: "The Yale athlete does not die
young, nor is heart disease a leading
cause of death. Lung trouble is the
cause of the greatest number, but the
percentage of men dying from these
causes is not greater than among non-
athletes." In spite of this, those who
have milk in their veins instead of
blood will continue to harp about the
danger of athletics, and, unfortunately,
will find plenty to believe in their false
theories.

SUPPRESSION OF TIME
An evil which should be stamped
from every track, 12.....

The question of suppression of
time is again causing quite an agita-
tion among horsemen in the United
States, and, judging by the numerous
letters that have appeared recently
in the leading turf journals on the
subject, this evil is more prevalent
than was generally supposed.

A few years back suppressing time
was quite common in Ontario, but
fortunately it is almost a thing of
the past on the Canadian circuit. Last
year from the opening meeting at
Seaford until the close of the regular
circuit races at St. Thomas there was
only one track where the time an-
nounced did not correspond with the
watches of independent timers, and
then the difference was in two beats
only, and was more the result of care-
less timing on the part of the appoint-
ed timers than through any sinister
motive.

Suppression of time is an evil the
unfairness of which is so apparent
that it is surprising any owner
would look for favor from such a prac-
tice. At most it can benefit but one
horse at the expense of all the others
that are in competition with this
horse, and the injustice to the others
is so great the wonder is that open
protest is not made wherever time
suppression occurs.

In running races the time does not
cut much of a figure, as the pace set
in the race governs the time to a
large extent, but the conditions are
far different with the trotters and
pacers. The harness horses are vir-
tually handicapped according to the
time made by the winners, and con-
sequently if the welfare of the sport
is to be regarded it is absolutely ne-
cessary that the time of each heat be
recorded accurately and be announced
properly, otherwise there is bound to
be confusion for everybody except,
possibly the owners of favored horses
and those directly responsible for the
improper timing.

Incapable timers are not uncommon
at harness horse meetings; in fact,
race managers as a rule pay less at-
tention to the selection of timers for
their meetings than they do the judges,
and this is little enough, goodness
knows. But, after all, this is only an
other illustration of the negligence of
the National and American Trotting
Associations, the parent bodies, that
are supposed to govern all harness
horse racing, that takes place on
tracks in membership with them.—
Sunday World.

RUGBY FOR RUGBY'S SAKE
The Welsh do not look kindly on
giving Testimonials.

They hold very strict views, and
draw a very sharp line in Welsh Rug-
by football, as witness this from the
Swansea correspondent of a London
newspaper:—
A national testimonial to Richard
M. Owen, the famous Welsh half-
back, has been proposed by his Swan-
sea friends, and from what can be
gathered this has met with general
approval. From inquiries I have made
to-day, however, I understand that the
Welsh Rugby Union do not look upon
the affair with a kindly eye at all. In
fact, it has been said in all serious-
ness that Owen will be declared pro-
fessional if anything on a big scale is
attempted.

There is, of course, a well-known
precedent for this. W. J. Bancroft,
also of Swansea, who held the record
for appearances in international foot-
ball prior to Owen's recent game at
Twickenham, was made a professional
after accepting a testimonial on his
retirement.
