It is planned to have a reunion of all the "sour doughs" in Prince Rupert on this occasion. LECTURED ON SOCIALISM

Mr. Code Criticized the Creed
Keenly Last Night.

In the Presbyterian Hall last
night before an audience which
ought to have been larger Mr.
Code, assistant to Principal
Hunter at the public school, gave
an interesting lecture on Social-
ism. He criticized the supposed
remedy for social hardships
thoroughly and held that things
as they are are no worse than
they would be under Socialism,
while they are gradually getting
better. Mr. Naden threw a dif-
ferent light on this view by
pointing out very ably that the
steady increase in the cost of
living recently has taken from
the laborer much that he had
under his wage scale of ten years
ago, while the wealthy are even
more luxurious than before.
Several other speakers gave in-
teresting views. Mr. Code's re-
ply was brief and final in substi-
tution of his own views.
