### LIVE PICTURES THAT CAN SPEAK

"Chronophone" Films in Natural Colors Given with Realism—Science at Last Achieves a Triumph.

London, May 21.—Moving pictures that speak were exhibited last night at the Royal Institute here. Films were shown of a cock crowing and lions roaring in a den, the sound being reproduced with such startling realism that the pictures appeared to roar. A demonstration of the "chronophone," as it is called, by means of which cinematograph films and gramophone records can be presented simultaneously with the sounds and movements in perfect union, was given two years ago, but was then not quite perfect. Since then the inventors have overcome all difficulties and the "chronophone" pictures are in natural colors.

### CANADIAN CHURCH

Bishop Perrin is in Favor of Establishment in Dominion.

London, May 21.—Bishop Perrin, formerly of British Columbia, defends church establishment, declaring that his eighteen years' experience in Canada shows him that no established church is lost to the whole community.

"I'd prefer the establishment of Presbyterians of Congregationalists rather than that there should be no state recognition of religion," he says.
