## BOMBER HAS CLOSE CALL

Engines Pick Up As Machine Reaches Level Where Enemy Had Range

LONDON, March 10: (CP)—Winter flying raises hazards that call for the greatest skill if the flight is to be carried to its end successfully.

A Royal Air Force coastal command pilot, describing an attack on Brest, told how the engines of his Blenheim bomber led up and stopped, forcing the plane so close to the ground that men manning anti-aircraft guns could be seen.

When the engines stopped the pilot said he was not worried because he expected they would pick up again when he came down to warmer air. Dodging searchlights

and violent fire, the plane came down to 3,000 feet and then a shell tore a hole two feet square in the port wing.

"I called to the observer to get rid of the bombs on something useful, because we hadn't enough height to go round again. By now we were so low we could see almost everything on the ground and in the harbor. The gunner got the dinghy ready in case we came down in the water and later he swore he could see the black shapes of men by the guns on the ground."

At 1,000 feet the plane was caught in a searchlight beam, but at the same time the engines picked up and the pilot raced out of the harbor without further damage to his machine.

sically and spiritually sturdy. He has a square face, light, almost-white hair cut fairly short.

With square fingers he toys with a pair of horn-rimmed spectacles (almost regulation for high officers of the services) and while he sees visitors or works he keeps a flat, gold vest-pocket watch with the lid open on his desk. Only two things are on his office walls, a map of Canada and a map of Australia. They are stuck with colored pins which denote airfields and training schools.

Through curious chance he finds himself again associated with his old comrades in the Royal Naval Air Service of the First Great War. Breadner, McKean and Goble were all lieutenants when they flew in the same squadron.

Breadner fought throughout the war. McKean had the ill luck to be captured early and remained a prisoner. After the war these men were widely separated, one in Canada, one in England and one in Australia.

The air lanes drew them closer from time to time but their paths were separate until the drums of international events and the wisdom of the British democracies raised them to high place, fetched them up in the same office on Bank Street—25 years after.

### Many Adventures

Goble, it would seem, was bound to come to join his old associates. When he left Australia with his wife on the steamship Niagara several months ago their vessel struck a mine. All took to the boats and for eight hours floated about on the Pacific. Returning to Australia Goble and his wife took another boat and made the voyage safely.

Goble was 23 when he joined the British air force. He is now 49. But in those old days, he says, it was not as generally supposed, a sort of knight errand business with a single flier taking off to pick his own opponent and carry on an aerial duel.

"There was quite a lot of formation flying although of course not comparable to what we have today. The whole build-up has been a stupendous feat. The standard of flying has improved enormously."

Goble doesn't talk much about what he did in the last war. He recalls with regret the loss of three of his commanders, Canadians, in the first squadron he led. They were Allan Todd of Toronto; Stanley Trapp of New Westminster,

and "Nigger" Galbraith, of Carleton Place, Ont. Others he remembers from those days were W. S. Elliott of St. Catharines, Ont., Charles Sproatt and William Cleghorn.

"These are a few names that come to my mind," he said "Since coming to Canada I have met many old friends. They are all damned good fellows."

Goble obviously has in eminent degree the qualities the civilian has come to associate with the air force—fortitude, steadiness, modesty—a new sort of outlook acquired by men who have learned to suffer the sudden departure of associates, whose horizons are as limitless as the air, men who have been and seen.

He has been in Malta, Egypt, Palestine, India, Malaya, China and the Dutch East Indies, all over the southern and eastern hemispheres and Europe and now finds a rest for his 32 years in the new west. In the last 30 years he has never lived under one roof more than 18 months.

### Many Decorations

In 1924 he was advanced from the rank of Order of the British Empire to be a Commander of the Order. That was for being the first to circumnavigate the vast continent of Australia. He did it in a seaplane with an officer who has since been killed.

For war services he wears on his tunic the ribbons of the D.S.C. and the D.S.O., the latter having been won as a flight lieutenant at the same time as he received special promotion on the field. The French decorated him with the Croix de Guerre.

Goble studied at the Imperial Staff College in England with Lt. Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton, commander of the Canadian Corps in England. He has been Chief of Air Staff in Australia, deputy director of operations of the Air Ministry and Commander of No. 2 Bomber Group R.A.F. from its inception in the middle of 1926 to the end of 1937.

It might have been expected that a flier and technician, of his quality might have lost some of the feel of the earth, the humanity of men in the street, but Goble speaks of homely things like losing his baggage with the same interest as John Doe.

The Vice-Marshal's wife is in Ottawa with him. He has three sons, one a midshipman in the Royal Australian Navy and two in boarding schools in Melbourne.


