## FINDING A SUITABLE WIFE FOR THE PRINCE OF WALES

TASK FOR THE ROYAL MATCH MAKERS OF THE COURTS OF EUROPE—POOR YOUNG PRINCE HAS VERY LITTLE TO SAY IN THE MATTER.

It is the habit of royalty to mate early, and that is why the match makers are already discussing the matrimonial possibilities for the Prince of Wales. That Edward is the most desirable "catch" in the world, even apart from his heirship to the British throne, is a point that has been brought out in the discussion, but his rank removes him from all calculations respecting ladies not of royal blood. There have been cases of royal British princesses being married to other than princes, as, for example, the Marquis of Lorne and the Duke of Fife, but while such matches were extremely popular, it is not likely that the heir to the British throne would be permitted to wed one of his fair countrywomen, since he will be expected to marry for reasons of State rather than for reasons of sentiment.

This is not to intimate that Royal marriages are not the result of affection, for very often they are true romances, but the love match is merely incidental, and while it is not likely that a Royal pair would be thrust into a union absolutely hateful to them, neither would they be permitted to let their fancy rove where it pleased from cottage to castle.

## The Czar's Daughter

There are two princesses whose names naturally occur as filling all the conditions necessary for a marriage with the heir to the British throne. One is the Grand Duchess Olga of Russia, the oldest daughter of the Czar; the other is the Princess Victoria Louise of Germany, the only daughter of the Kaiser.

The Princess Olga is about the same age as the Prince of Wales, and is said to be a very pretty girl, though not such a beauty as her mother. It is thought that a match between this pair would be very gratifying to both the Dowager Empress of Russia and the Queen Mother Alexandra. From a political point of view it is believed that the match would be approved by

the present government but opposed by the Unionists, who have no great fancy for further Russian alliances.

The King and Queen too it is hinted by those who are supposed to know, would not be favorably inclined, though it is not expected that they would actually oppose anything decided on by the government. It is only natural, however, that in a matter of this sort the wishes of King George and Queen Mary would have especial weight.

As regards the German Princess, it is said that as she has been brought up with a family of brothers, who are all supposed to be anti-English, the young people would not likely be congenial. Moreover, there are political objections to still further Germanizing the British Crown. That such a union would do much to wipe out the existing relations between the two countries which are far from being as cordial as might be desired is claimed by those approving this match.

It is doubtful however, if these hopes would be realized by a marriage alone, for it is to be borne in mind that the situation with regard to Germany and Britain has developed with the grandson of Queen Victoria, the nephew of King Edward, and the cousin of King George, on the German throne, and of the Kaiser's deep affection for his grandmother there has never been any question. Moreover the wretched experiences of the British Princess who became the Empress of Germany have not been forgotten.

## A Romanian Princess

Another charming princess against whom there could be no political objections is the Princess Elizabeth of Roumania. This princess is the daughter of the Crown Prince and the Crown Princess of Roumania and grand daughter of the Duke of Edinburgh, who later became Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. She has been brought up in English fa-

shion, and her mother, "Carmen Silva," is undoubtedly one of the most popular of the Royalities that visit England, which is the land of her birth.

A union between the Roumanian and the British crowns could hardly be of great advantage from a political point of view, but on the other hand, it would be free from the objections that might be urged against a match with either the Russian or the German princess. Princess Maud of Fife, the youngest daughter of the Princess Royal, is a lovely girl, and is mentioned among the eligibles, though she is the first cousin to the Prince of Wales.

The British Constitution declares the Prince of Wales from marrying a Roman Catholic, although it does not prevent English princesses from taking Roman Catholic husbands, as was the case with the Princess Ena, who became the Queen of Spain, and abandoned her religion. In the case of the bride of the Prince of Wales it would not be enough for her to change her religion.

She must have been born and brought up a Protestant, though it does not matter what Protestant sect or denomination she has been a member of. Prince Edward himself is a shy boy of 18, and it is likely that nothing is further from his thoughts than marriage, but it is improbable that he will attain the age of 21 without becoming betrothed, if not wedded.

## MORE BLACK TROUBLE AHEAD

Miners in Great Britain Declare It Impossible to Make a Living Wage Out of Work Under the Minimum Wage Bill.

London, May 30.—The Federation of Miners at a recent session adopted resolutions declaring that under the decisions of the minimum wage boards in many districts, especially in South Wales, men are unable to make even a living wage. They demand that Premier Asquith at once call on Parliament to amend the law and remedy defects already apparent.

## GERMANY ADDING TO HER FORCES

Considerable Additions Are Being Made to Both Army and Navy—Millions of Dollars to Be Spent on Ships and Equipment.

Berlin, May 30.—The Reichstag has passed the third reading of the bills increasing the German army and navy. The navy bill provides for an extra battle squadron, for which three additional battleships and two cruisers are to be constructed before 1920. The estimated additional cost is \$24,250,000 this year, \$31,750,000 next year and \$28,500,000 yearly afterward.

The army bill provides for an increase of 29,000 men, excluding officers, non-commissioned officers and other details in the peace footing in the army.

## FATE OF ANDREE THE EXPLORER

Tribe of Eskimos Have a Story of a "Bubble" That Came from Heaven—They Killed a Man Who Dropped With It.

Christian Laden, a Norwegian explorer, has returned to this country with what he believes to be the first evidence of the fate of Andree's balloon. Laden was commissioned by the Royal Museum of Berlin, the University of Berlin and the University of Christiania to explore the unknown region of Northwestern Canada and to obtain data about the Indian tribes in the region, some of which have never before been visited by white men.

At a point two hundred miles north by west of the point at which it has been generally believed that Andree perished, Laden encountered a tribe of Eskimos who related a story to the effect that several years ago a large bubble fell from the heavens, containing two creatures supposed to be "devils," and that these creatures were able to hurl forth fire and thunder from strange implements that they carried.

The members of the tribe attacked the two creatures and succeeded in killing one of them with arrows, whereupon the other made motions to them signifying that he and his companion were shooting at birds for food and had come in peace. When the Eskimos realized that they had attacked human beings who had no unfriendly motive they fled in dismay, leaving the surviving white man alone. What became of him they do not know.

## PLAY NAKED IN THE SNOW

Switzerland's Unique Method for Warring Against Consumption.

Montreal, May 30.—Children playing naked in the snow of the Alps at Lauzanne, Switzerland, in order to take the sunlight cure for tuberculosis diseases of the bone and joints was one of the remarkable sights investigated by Dr. A. J. Richer, the Montreal tuberculosis specialist, who for the past seven months has been visiting sanatoria in Europe so as to give to the Dominion government a report on the latest methods now in use to combat the disease. Dr. Richer concluded his investigations by attending the International Tuberculosis Conference at Rome, from April 10th to 15th, and the International Tuberculosis Congress from April 14th to 21st at the same place.

## R.N.W.M.P. WANT MORE RECRUITS

Attractions of Famous Redcoat Patrol Brigade Do Not Seem Sufficient Now to Counteract Enticements of Real Estate.

Ottawa, May 30.—Great difficulty is being experienced by the North West Mounted Police department in securing new recruits for the force. Inspector Gordon, who is at present in the maritime provinces, advises that he finds it practically impossible to secure recruits of the standard of efficiency and intelligence required by the department.

The reason given is that the muneration is not sufficiently great in view of the increasing opportunities in other fields.

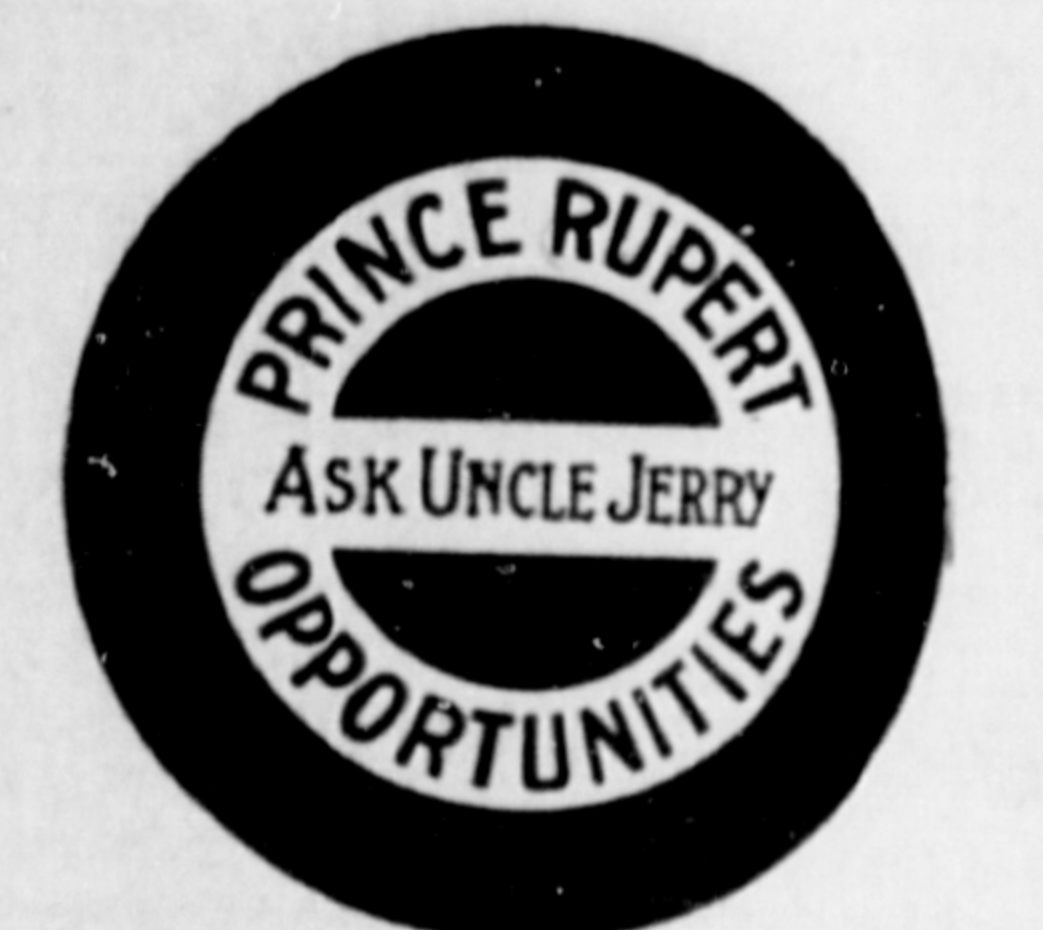
