OH, WHAT A BAD 'KNOCK' HERE!

What Will Vancouver People Do to a Paper Which Dares to Publish That the City Is at Its Borrowing Limit.

Because the city has no borrowing power left the directors of the Vancouver General Hospital have been forced to lay over their plans for the expenditure of some \$200,000 in the construction of a new nurses' home building, an infectious diseases ward and other additional wings.

A delegation from the hospital board, comprising Messrs. Salsbury and Banfield, Drs. Proctor, Carder, McKee and others, waited upon the health committee the other afternoon with a request for a bylaw to construct these buildings.

Mr. Salsbury explained that he for one was not anxious for such a bylaw until the report of the hospital investigation committee had been given and he thought that the matter could be laid over until the first of the year. Dr. Proctor spoke in reference to the need of new buildings.

It was explained by Chairman Cameron and Comptroller Baldwin that the borrowing power of the city had been exhausted and that the city was not in any position to give this amount of money by public bylaw even if it so wished.

Hearing this explanation, the hospital delegation departed with the statement that the request would be preferred again next January.—Vancouver Province.

constructed dock on the Pacific coast.

Owing to the great rise and fall of tide at Prince Rupert, and to the fact that the low tides came only during the night time, all through the course of construction considerable difficulties had to be overcome by the contractors, as all the lower braces were run during the winter months at night by torch light, and great credit is due them for their success in this difficult undertaking.

Successful Experiment.

The government's successful experiment in the adoption of concrete piling will undoubtedly result in the construction of many concrete wharves in this province, as the utility of a permanent and indestructible pile in the waters of the Pacific, where the teredo works such havoc on all wooden structures, is unquestionable. Similar concrete piles have been used with great success in Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and elsewhere, and the method is one that will undoubtedly replace all other forms of construction for permanent piers and wharves.

Salt Biggest Afloat.

The entire frontage of the Digby Island wharf has been carefully dredged, which gives a sufficient depth of water to allow the largest steamer afloat to come alongside.

At present all steamers of the Marine department operate from Victoria, says the Colonist, but it is a considerable distance for the ships to travel before reaching the lights and buoys of the north. It is understood that the new tender Estevan will be operated in connection with the new station and that the Quadra and Newtonton will look after the work on the west coast and the inside passage as far north as Queen Charlotte Sound.

The fact that health inspection can be made at this new station will also serve to expedite shipping at the rapidly growing port of the northern metropolis.
