ATITH LABOR ENTERING a last-minute slate, the candidates are in the W field for Prince Rupert's municipal election. The nominations closed yesterday and the voting will take place on Thursday.

A goodly number of citizens have been public-spirited enough to offer their services to the electors.

Now we can appropriately suggest that the electors themselves give careful thought to the field and be sufficiently interested to come out on

Thursday and vote. Running of the city is one of Prince Rupert's biggest businesses. The people who we elect on Thursday from among those who offered themselves Monday will have the job of dictating civic policy in a year which will mark a critical phase of transition from war to peace conditions. Among other things they will have to face up fairly and squarely to several important problems including that of rebuilding of municipal utilities and services on a major scale. They may also be called upon to devise ways and means of co-operating with and encouraging the establishment of industries here.

Laissez-faire methods of merely "carrying on" city affairs will be no longer good enough. There is a lot of important business to be dealt with and it should be a year of less talking and more doing.

Therefore, it is important that the voters get out on Thursday to vote for the people who they think will be best able to carry on a business in which every one is vitally interested.
