## NATIVE GROUP TO EXPAND IN THIS DISTRICT

A conference of members of the northern district of the Native Brotherhood of B. C., which terminated here at the week-end was aimed at expanding the organization into the interior of the province, and unifying administration in parts already organized.

To spark the expansion drive, Edward Bolton, northern district vice-president, and Vincent Wells, northern business agent, were directed to organize the Babine Lake area later this month, and at the same time, to study social and economic conditions among the interior native inhabitants.

In order to simplify the administration of the northern district it was decided to name two new vice presidents, one for the Naas River area and one for the Queen Charlotte Islands. Johnson Russ, a former northern district vice-president was placed at the head of the Naas River area and Matthew Williams in the Queen Charlotte Islands.

General discussions took place in regard to fish, timber and embargo questions, aimed mainly at directing a line of policy for negotiation.

On the matter of native reforms which are taking shape at Ottawa, emphasis was placed on preparedness to give evidence before the joint Parliamentary committee, and other official bodies, should it be required.

Chairman of the conference was William Scow, of Alert Bay, president of the Native Brotherhood of B. C. Other officials were Ambrose Reid, Native Brotherhood adviser; Dr. Peter R. Kelly, legislative chairman; Thomas Gosnell, legislative committee; Edward Bolton, northern district vice-president; Vincent Wells, northern business agent; Charles Patsy, northern interior vice president, Oliver Adams, treasurer.

## HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I reduce the electric light bill?
